The dead man had few personal effects, but when an ordinary travelling-bag was lifted from the floor Mr. Simpson was surprised at its weight and opened it to ascertain the cause. He was amazed, for before him in the bag he saw \$4,000 worth of jewelry, comprising rings of every description, gold watches, pins and diamonds, brooches, chains and charms. All this valuable property had been stolen from his own store by the man whom he had trusted and befriended in life and death. In Forstner's clothes were found jewels only recently stolen.
The cost marks even had not been removed and it was an easy matter for Mr.
Simpson to identify his property.
