WHOLESALE ATTEMPT AT POISONING IN ST. JOHN.

The St. John papers of last week contain lengthy accounts of an attempt to poison the families of four clergymen of that city by poisoned candy. The candy which was neatly packed in paper boxes was taken off by Mrs. Macrae the wife of the well-known Presbyterian clergyman of St. John, from the effects of which she died on the morning of Wednesday last. A despatch to the Montreal Times says:—

Soon after arising Mrs. Macrae remarked that she was not well, but afterwards took breakfast with her family as usual. After her son had left the house Mrs. Macrae seemed to feel worse and finally sent the domestic for Dr. Christie. She grew rapidly worse and expired soon after the doctor arrived. The hearing news was soon learned by the two sons who had left the house to attend to business and they at once communicated with Rev. Dr. Macrae, who was absent in Picton, and two daughters who were also away. Mrs. Macrae was a daughter of the late Kenneth Macrae, a well-known ship owner of St. John's, N.S. She is in her 47th year.

The St. John correspondent of the Times telegraphed last night: The shock of regret caused by the news of the sudden death of the wife of Rev. Dr. Macrae yesterday gave place to a feeling of

MOST INTENSE HORROR and indignation when the whisper went abroad that she was the victim of the most diabolical attempt at wholesale poisoning ever perpetrated in these provinces. Inquiry and investigation had to confirm the truth of the whisper.

Mrs. Macrae died without symptoms of strychnine poison. After her death one of the boys found on the table a little box of candy from which one or two pieces had been eaten. This box of candy came by mail addressed to Rev. Dr. Macrae. Suspicion was aroused and an analysis by W. E. Best revealed strychnine in the candy which was of the most tempting kind. A post-mortem was held but the inquest adjourned until Monday next. It is now learned that on the same morning

PROBABLY SIMILAR PACKAGES of candy were received by Rev. J. DeSjones, of St. John's Episcopal church and by Rev. T. J. Deland of Exmouth street Methodist Church. Mrs. Deland opened the package and was just about to give candy to her little girl when she thought that she had better not.

Rev. Mr. Deland took the package to an analyst and found that it was saturated with strychnine. Rev. Mr. DeSjones received the package and took a piece of the candy. It tasted bitter and he spat it out. Later it was analysed and found to contain enough strychnine to

POISON A WHOLE FAMILY.

Solicitor-General Pugsley is working on the case, and medical men will examine the dead woman's stomach before the inquest is resumed. Profound mystery surrounds the affair and no possible motive can be conceived for the horrible plot of which Mrs. Macrae fell a victim. The general public have not been acquainted with the fact but when they were told tomorrow and learn the diabolical work that has been done there will be excitement such as no former crime has ever aroused. Conjecture is useless for the fact that three clergymen of three different denominations were selected, upsets all theories of personal malice. The general opinion of those who have learned the facts seems to be that it must be the work of some organized mind.

The St. John Telegraph of Saturday says:—

A FOURTH CLERGYMAN to whom had been addressed one of the deadly packages and who together with his family, had almost providentially escaped, from death. The reverend gentleman referred to is Rev. J. L. Shaw, a retired Baptist minister, who resides at No. 75 King street. Yesterday morning a Telegraph reporter found his way to Rev. Mr. Shaw's apartments, and in company with several other callers, awaited the reverend gentleman's arrival.

Mr. Shaw's first business was to attend to a messenger from the post office. The messenger requested Mr. Shaw to bring a box, which he understood the reverend gentleman had received, to the office of Mr. King, post-office inspector, for purposes of investigation. Mr. Shaw replied that the box had passed from his possession; he had given it to Mr. G. U. Hay. Mr. Shaw stated that he, like the other clergymen, had received a box through the mail. He opened it just

after finishing dinner. His daughter at once tasted a piece of the candy and found it had a bitter taste. Mr. Shaw also put a piece in his mouth, but hastily removed it. The

TALE WAS SO BAD

that that he had to take a bite of an apple to remove the disagreeable flavor. He could not get the taste from his mouth for some time. He said he had been in the habit of joking with a lady who was stopping in the house about a treat of candy. His first impression was that the lady referred to had sent him a box of bitter candy to pay him up for his joking. In examining the candy Miss Shaw broke a chocolate drop in two and found that it did not appear to have been tampered with. She gave it to the servant girl and although the latter ate a small portion of it she suffered no ill effect. It would appear that this was the

ONLY TRICE FROM POISON.

Shortly after dinner, Miss Shaw began to feel ill, but she went to school, and nothing more was thought of the matter until she came home again, having been forced to leave school on account of illness. There can be no doubt that she had swallowed a small portion of the noxious candy, but happily did not take enough to produce fatal results.

In the story of Mrs. Macrae's death and the revelations which came to light yesterday morning Mr. Shaw discovered like the other parties, that the affair was no practical joke but nothing short of a foul attempt at murder by poison. Mr. Shaw has not been before the public for some time and of course is at a disadvantage to account for this mysterious attempt upon the lives of himself and family.

ARREST OF A DRUG CLERK FOR THE ACT.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 6.—The arrest of William McDonald, drug clerk in T. B. Barker & Sons' establishment, in connection with the poisoned candy case, one of the themes of conversation here to-day. Solicitor-General Pugsley has charge of the case, and he positively refused to say on what grounds he ordered McDonald's arrest beyond that he considered he had a strong case otherwise he would not have taken the step he did. McDonald is a brother of the late Mary Barker's wife and there is general sympathy for him who is taking arrest very much to heart. No woman in St. John had suffered more than she. Her father died suddenly, then her mother, then followed her brother's insanity (the one now under arrest) and his removal to a lunatic asylum, next her husband's death and now her brother's arrest. The man under arrest was discharged from the asylum in May last as cured.

But since that time he is said to have showed at times strong symptoms of insanity. Before being sent to the asylum he had a religious craze, but lately he showed just the opposite and is known to have frequently expressed his utter disbelief in the whole Christian ministry. It is known beyond a doubt that information on which McDonald was arrested was furnished by a woman but just under what circumstances remains to be learned. One story is that a boy was given packages to mail and after the affair was published in the and became general talk he told his mother who furnished the clue, while another is that a young woman in the wholesale department of Barker's store saw McDonald preparing the boxes and matter. It weighed so heavily on her mind that she felt it was her duty to make it known to the authorities and consequently did so. The inquest commences to-morrow night at 7 o'clock. The prisoner has engaged C. A. Stockton to watch the inquest in his behalf.

NEWS FROM EVERYWHERE.

A considerable portion of the town of Grand Haven, Mich., was burned on the 2nd inst. loss \$1,000,000.

A Nova Scotia clergyman named McLeod is under arrest in Chicago on a charge of bigamy.

Asiatic cholera is raging in South-eastern Europe.

The jury 327 jurors have been excused in the Cronin murder trial, and four have been accepted.

Mr. Kitchin, of ship railway frame, has just completed a survey of Hants Central railway, in the interests of English capitalists. The crossing of the Shubenacadie River necessitates the erection of a bridge 3000 feet long. The bridge will be composed of 11 spans of 200 feet each, besides a large pivot span. The piers upon which it will rest will be fifty feet high. The cost will be about half a million dollars.

At Milwaukee, Wisconsin, a few days ago a faithful citizen was narrowly averted. The soil on a hillside on which hundred thousand people were assembled slipped and moved some distance towards a lake below, leaving a deep fissure at the top. It is thought that it has not been for a stone railway bed at the foot of the hill, the whole hillside would have swept into the lake, carrying the people with it.

CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 2.—There is an indentation in the State of Campeche formed by Laguna Lake, which is separated from the Gulf of Mexico by several islands, the largest of which is the Isla del Carmen. This island is populated, there being several towns, the largest of which is Carmen.

The cyclone struck the coast of Campeche on the 19th, and a gale from that date until the 21st, with drenching rain, devastated the seaboard of the peninsula for miles. The hurricane was so strong in Campeche that it pulled trees by their roots and deposited them upon houses, which they crushed like egg shells.

The inhabitants were terrified and misallies of all kinds were flying about the streets, knocking in windows, destroying vegetation and keeping the people from seeking safety in the open air. The sub-tropical sea generated volumes of vapor, the very fuel of the cyclone engine, and upon this lay full until the shipping in the harbor and about the island had been wrecked. Vessel after vessel was driven ashore. Twelve French gun-boats were stranded; two steamships and twenty schooners and many smaller craft were wrecked. The number of lives lost is unknown.
