New H.C. Of Living Board

Ottawa, Aug. 13.—The Canadian Board of Commerce has been officially constituted with Judge Robson, of Winnipeg, as chairman and W. F. O'Connor, K. C., former cost of living commissioner, as second member and these two gentlemen have had a conference with the Government and have already started work.

Judge Robson arrived in Ottawa today and shortly afterward met members of the Government. The third member of the board it is expected, will be named within a couple of days. The board will act under the combines and fair prices act and is given power to institute investigations on its own motion or at the request of ministers or other responsible persons bringing matters to the notice of the board.

When seen this afternoon by the Canadian Press, Judge Robson was emphatic in his statement that there would be no fuss and formalities attached to the working of this board.

The chairman of the new board stated, however, that the board would of necessity investigate the facts behind a complaint before holding sittings at any point. This was necessary, he stated, because the board has jurisdiction from coast to coast and a complaint might take them from Halifax to Vancouver on a wild goose chase if it were only made because of some mere theory.

The two members of the new body had a long conference this afternoon, and will be together most of the time during the next few days drawing up simple rules of procedure and getting together the necessary small staff and officers organization for their work.

Placed With Appointment

Brandon, Man., Aug. 13.—With reference to the accusation made by Dr. R. J. McFall, cost of living commissioner, Geo. W. Markie, President of the retail merchants association, now in convention in this city, has issued the following statement:

The position of the retail merchants of this country is pretty well indicated by the fact that they have, for some years, been endeavoring to have the government appoint what has always been referred to as an in land trade commissioner. After persistent urging on the part of the retailers the Government has seen its way clear to appoint a board of commerce. The retailers are enthusiastic over the appointment of this board and especially with the chairman, Judge Robson, who is not only known in Western Canada but throughout all Canada as a man of unusual administrative ability. The retailers are quite confident that the matter referred to by Mr. McFall if dealt with by this board of commerce will not result in anyway to the discredit of the association.

Disappearing Forests

We are beginning to realize at last (says a writer in Conservation), that our Canadian forests are disappearing very rapidly, but very few, even among those of us familiar with our woods, appreciate how fast this process has actually become. Fires, insects and fungi are the greatest enemies we have to deal with. The fire problem is rapidly being solved. The injuries by insects and fungi, on the other hand, have, until recently, been practically unrecognized. The actual conditions, however, indicate that these injuries are annually much greater in our forests than those caused by fires. This subject is of the utmost importance to the lumbermen and Provincial authorities of Eastern Canada and should receive immediate and very serious consideration.

Hon. P. J. Veniot In Accident

With Mr. Hill driving the car, Hon. Mr. Veniot left Fredericton last Wednesday morning, accompanied by Harvey Mitchell, an official of the Federal Agricultural Department and Tilley Maxwell, an official of the Provincial Department of Public Works. The bridge, where the accident occurred, is at the foot of a steep hill down which they coasted, and it is believed they were running at too fast a speed to make the required turn which caused them to crash through the railing.

Another auto party coming along soon afterwards found the wrecked car turned upside down on a pile of logs in the bed of the stream some fifteen feet below the level of the bridge with four of its occupants pinned under the wreckage. They were extricated, and later it was said that their injuries consisted only of some painful bruises.

Suppress Sinn Fein Meetings

London, Aug. 14 The government announced that owing to increase in crimes in County Clare it has been decided to suppress all Sinn Fein and kindred organization in that county.

Several despatches received recently from London have told of disturbances in Clare and East Clare. On Aug. 3rd a party consisting of twenty to thirty men attacked the Broadfield police barracks. A brisk fire was maintained upon the barracks for more than an hour, with the police answering it. One constable was said to have been slightly wounded. Two days later at Ennistimon, County Clare, Sergeant Flanagan and Constable Murphy were shot and killed, while on Aug. 9 at Molone, East Clare, some thirty men attacked a police hut with rifle and revolver fire. This fight lasted more than an hour. None of the police were hit, but the despatch said it was believed two of the attackers were wounded.

A proclamation issued from Dublin Castle July 7 declared all Sinn Feiners and the Irish Volunteers in the County Tipperary unlawful associations.

Funeral of Late Andrew Carnegie

Lenox, Mass., Aug. 14.—The funeral of Andrew Carnegie was held at Shadow Brook, his summer home in the Berkshires today. There was no eulogy and there were no pall bearers. The service was as simple as were the habits of his life.

Fully one half of the sixty persons present were members of the household. The others were intimates of the family.

The ritual of the Presbyterian Church was used by the officiating clergyman, Rev. William Pierson Merrill, of the Brick Presbyterian Church, Fifth Avenue, New York.

A mixed quartette from this church sang the three hymns which have been the favorites of the philanthropist and former iron master.

Interment will be this afternoon in a lot chosen by Mr. Carnegie some years ago at Sleepy Hollow, near Tarryton N. Y.

Andrew Carnegie had given away \$350,695,653 up to June 1, 1918 according to a compilation of his benefactions prepared by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. He is said to have died with only about \$30,000,000 left. His principal gifts are summarized as follows:

About 3,000 library buildings, \$60,000,000.

College endowments, \$17,000,000.

Church organs, \$6,000,000.

Carnegie Institution, Washington, R. C., \$22,000,000.

Carnegie Institute of Technology, \$10,000,000.

Endowment for International Peace, \$10,000,000.

Steel workers' pensions, \$4,000,000.

Church Peace Union, \$2,000,000.
