If it be in the power of our Municipal Councillors to remedy this condition of affairs, they should give it immediate attention and compel street sellers to call out their wares, thus, any house-keeper wishing to purchase vegetables, fish, splits, etc., would be on the "qui vive" for what she required.

Come, then, Councillor Martin, if you value the support of the women of the city make a move in this matter and you may feel assured the result will be to your advantage.

Shipbuilding Yard for Canada.

OTTAWA, Ont., June 10.
Plans have been made at Ottawa by Vickers, Son and Maxim, of England, for a two and a half million dollar shipbuilding and ship repair plant to be erected at Montreal, the plans including a floating dry dock, three large berths for the repairing and building of steel vessels, machine shops and a plant capable of doing the heaviest construction and repair work, covering some 50 acres of ground. Application has been made to the Government for a dock subsidy, and this will undoubtedly be granted at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent. for 25 years on two and a half millions. The working and final plans of the project are being brought by Mr. Vickers, who will shortly reach New York. An examination of land on file at Ottawa indicates the intention of the firm to make a serious bid for the construction of the destroyers, which Canada will soon give. Contracts for this class of craft has been a specialty of the firm.

Pilgrims Banquet Lieut. Peary.

LONDON, June 10.
Commander Robert E. Peary, who, after a tour of Europe, will sail for the United States to-morrow on board the steamship *Mauretania*, was given a dinner to-night by the Pilgrims' Society. The gathering, over which Lord Alverstone presided, was a most representative one, including Captain Robert E. Scott and other British explorers. The American pilgrims were represented by J. P. Morgan, General Stewart and others. Lord Alverstone in a speech paid tribute to the courage and determination of Peary and other American explorers. The Commander in reply, after expressing his thanks, related interesting incidents of these years of struggle in the frozen north.

Insurgent Strong- hold Captured.

MEXICO CITY, June 10.
Valladolid, the stronghold of the Indian insurgents in the Yucatan, was captured by Federal troops to-day. According to messages received to-night from Merida the rebels were driven from the town to the mountains. Hotly pursued many dead and wounded were abandoned in the flight and many taken prisoners by the Government forces.

Three Mails a Week.

MONTREAL, June 10.
Hon. Rudolph Lemieux, Postmaster General, was in the city to-day and stated that he had not yet made any arrangements with the Canadian Northern Royal Line or the White Star Dominion Line for the carrying of the mails, but he had no doubt that in the near future an arrangement would be arrived at by which three mails a week would leave Canada by the fastest boats for England. He said he was doing all he could to make such arrangements, so that no letters would leave Canada for Europe marked via New York.

A Record Surplus.

OTTAWA, June 10.
The final figures of the revenue and expenditure of the last fiscal year, ending March 31st last, made public by the Department of Finance this afternoon, shows a record surplus of \$22,092,185 in revenue over all ordinary expenditure. This exceeds by over two and a half millions previous the high record of 1907-8, and is five millions better than the estimate given by the Finance Minister in his Budget Speech of December last. The total revenue was \$101,501,034, an increase of sixteen and one-half millions over the preceding year.

Swift Running Autos.

Wednesday night as a well known business man was driving out to the city with his family, when near White's Bridge, above the Lunatic Asylum, all narrowly escaped being killed or seriously hurt on account of an automobile. It turned the curve at great speed, the driver took the wrong side of the road, and but that the horse in its flight swerved a collision must have resulted. Drivers of autos on country roads travel altogether too fast. On Coronation St. Thursday night two men drove out at a high rate of speed, sounded no horn and pedestrians had to jump to the side of the road hurriedly to escape being killed. The pair singing lustily kept up the speed till they reached the outskirts of the city. If most autoists do not soon regulate the rate at which machines are driven in the country, plain clothes policemen will have to take a hand in bringing them to their senses.

Disgusted With the Government.

The settlers of Grady, Indian Tickle and other parts of the Labrador coast are disgusted with the action of the Government in not giving them information as regards fishery regulations this spring. Believing that it was not legal before a certain date to do so, these settlers did not put down their traps or secure their berths as usual and had not time to go act before the people from the Newfoundland bays were upon them and placed their twine in all the most eligible localities. The Government should have had a steamer down the shore far earlier than they had when this condition of affairs would have been obviated. They are incensed over the manner in which they have been treated in the premises and curse the stupidity and bungling of the Government.

Said to be a "Strad."

Reading an article in our paper of June the 3rd on Valuable Violins, Mr. Cook of the Southside was set thinking. He remembered that there was an inscription on the inside of his violin and he forthwith got the instrument and examined it and found the following: "Antonius Stradivarius Cremonensis faciebat Anno 1736." This was followed by a small circle with the letters A. S. and a cross within it. Mr. Cook believes

that he has a genuine "Strad." There is no doubt the instrument is very old, but whether it is a genuine "Strad" or no one but a virtuoso with long experience in violins can say. There are said to be 600 Strads in existence which are valued from \$2,500 to \$6,500 each.
