Bankers Arrive.

The banking sch. Orient, Capt. Pearcey, came to port yesterday from Fortune Bay. She has no fish on board, having landed her season's catch up to the present, 1,400 quintals, at Fortune. The Orient is here seeking a squid baiting, which she has been awaiting this past fortnight, to go on her final fishing trip. The sch. will likely go to Torbay to get baited.

The knockabout banker Gordon M. Hollett, Capt. William Hollett, also entered this port yesterday looking for squid. The vessel has 2,600 quintals of fish under salt which is above an average voyage. Capt. Hollett's brother Thomas, has 3,300 quintals landed and is one of the high liners.

Train Notes.

Owing to the wet weather yesterday railway traffic was poor. Only a few left by the regular in the morning, about 60 went out with the B. I. S., at 4.45 p.m., and the same applied to the express outward at 6 p.m. Less passenger traffic went over the line yesterday than for any holiday during the summer.
