

C.C.C. Win Football Cup.

Do Flying Fish Fly.

The much mooted question, "Do flying fish fly?" is dismissed by William Allingham in the "Nautical Magazine." The orthodox scientific opinion is that the "wings" of the flying fish merely serve as a parachute to sustain the fish for a brief period in the air after he has launched himself out of the water by a powerful screw-like movement of his tail. According to this view, the fish has no power of directing his flight after he has left the water.

However, Mr. Allingham, who is a nautical expert attached to the British Meteorological office and is in constant intercourse with seamen, reports many observations that tend to controvert this opinion. Certain observers claim that the wing fins are in constant rapid vibration and seem actually to serve the purpose of flight. One vessel master watched a fish that had attained an altitude of 20 above the water and was flying toward the mizen rigging of his ship when, apparently noticing obstruction, it changed course about 61 degrees, crossing the vessel's stern to regain the water. Many other similar observations are mentioned. A series of cinematograph pictures might solve this question once and for all—Scientific American.

Special to Evening Telegram. TORONTO, August 1. Fire in the Central Press Agency Building, to-day, caused damages to the extent of \$45,000.

ST. PETERSBURG, August 1. The Russian Government to-day decided not to participate officially in the Panama-Pacific Exhibition.

VANCOUVER, August 1. The Vancouver Railwaymen's Union has passed a resolution ordering all members of the militia in their ranks either to quit the militia or leave the Union. Twenty members of the Highlander regiment are street railway men.

BERLIN, August 1. Joseph Wood, negro, sentenced here to six months for vagrancy, is on a hunger strike in the county jail. Even when the jailer and cook offered him chicken and a slice of watermelon, he refused to eat. His strike has lasted for some days, but being of a strong constitution he has not weakened.

HONG KONG, August 1. General Yuan Shi Kai with a force of loyal troops is marching on Canton after taking possession of Shi-Wang on the west river. An engagement is imminent between General Ling's Army and troops despatched from Canton by the Governor General of Kwang Tung.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, August 1. After a conference with President Wilson, to-day, Secretary Bryan declared that the United States was in no way being pressed for action in Mexico, and declared the assertion in the morning papers that European Governments were bringing pressure to compel aggressive action in Mexico, was without foundation.

MUNCIE, Ind., August 1. A miraculous escape from death and injury took place to-day, when tender No. 2 of the East-bound train jumped the track in the middle of a 20 foot bridge, five miles west of Muncie. The train ran a third of a mile when four Pullmans left the track. Although two steel rails were driven through the floor of one of the Pullmans, not a single passenger or traman was injured.

BERLIN, August 1. Although the German Secretary of the Interior declared to-day that Germany had not yet taken any action regarding the question of participation in the Panama-Pacific Exposition of 1915, opinion is freely expressed in official circles that the German Empire will not be represented there. It is pointed out that Britain's decision settles Germany's action, as the only factor which might have induced the German Government to bring pressure to bear on unwilling industrial men to exhibit, was fear of unfavorable comparison with British industry.

Peckham, South Side Road asking for repair to roadway, which was caving in, were referred to the Engineer. T. P. Co.'s water car was reported by Water Inspector Baker to be giving unsatisfactory service. The R. N. Co. will be asked to explain. The oil sprinkling car will be put in operation on Regatta Day. The meeting then adjourned.

Text: "A Boston Globe reporter getting into conversation with an old gentleman recently in the Public Garden elicited the following opinion apropos of the easy time the present day fisherman has compared with the fisherman of a quarter of a century or more back: 'Take the fishing industry,' said he. 'In the old days the fisherman went out with a hook and line and caught one cod at a time. Now what does he do? He takes a line about 1,000 feet long with 500 hooks hanging from it, all baited—he calls it a trawl. A couple of them get into a dory and drop out one end of it and row along and drop the other end. They then sit down and light their pipes, and perhaps they have something on their lips, and they sit there about an hour. Then they haul up the trawl and there are 500 cod on it. Call that work? That work? That isn't work!' This would be a good illustration were it true. But if there is any fisherman along the New England coast to-day who can get a 500 hook trawl and, after letting it stay down an hour—or a week for that matter—then take off 500 codfish he can command any price he asks for his services. If the old gentleman of Boston had substituted the word 'dogfish' for 'cod' he would have come nearer the truth. Henri Dandurand, of the 6th Regiment, C. M. R. of Canada; for his father, U. H. Dandurand, of Montreal. Mr. Dandurand, who is one of Canada's pioneer motorists, enjoyed touring, but apparently did not care for the indifferent accommodation of the inns and small Canadian hotels; so he conceived the idea that a hotel on wheels would fill his wants in a far more satisfactory manner. The car's general layout can be gathered from the following: Immediately behind the driver's seat are the chauffeur's quarters. The tiny compartment contains ample room for a six-foot berth. Next to this is a ladies' stateroom having a series of berths with sleeping accommodations for five. Another stateroom of the same size—namely, six feet square—has sleeping accommodation for four. This compartment is used as a smoking-room, also as a dining-room, having two extension tables, each three feet long by nineteen inches wide. The room also contains a folding desk. Behind the compartment is a kitchenette, wonderfully designed to economize every possible inch of space. Drawers are divided into pigeon holes for crockery, etc. A linen cupboard and provision boxes are also fitted, and a splendid refrigerator, 36 by 28 inches, together with a neat gasoline stove, complete the fittings. Behind this again is an exceedingly well-fitted toilet room. The car can easily accommodate twenty-five people.
