Increase in British Officers' Salaries.

London, Nov. 25.—New rates of pay for army officers, showing increases of from 10 to 25 per cent. are announced in an army order. The new daily rate for a captain is raised from \$3 to \$3.50, and for a lieutenant, from \$2 to \$2.50. These increases also are augmented by various special allowances.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.
Nov. 29.—(Midnight).—During the 28th the enemy's cannonading was more active but consisted of firing mostly from 77 millimetre pieces. The enemy's heavy artillery did not contribute. Under these circumstances this artillery duel turned out everywhere in our favor. In Arras north-east district a German attack effected by about three regiments completely failed, after several respective counter attacks. Between the Somme and the Chaulnes we have marked good progress in neighborhood of Fay village where our troops came in immediate contact with a section of the enemy. In the Aisne region between Vailly and Berry-au-Bac, a group of machine guns and a couple of 30 centimetre pieces were destroyed by our shells which caused an explosion in the enemy's battery. On the Voignes three counter attacks by the Germans with the object of retaking the ground won previously by us in Ban De Sapt, have been successively repulsed.

Official.—Calm on the whole front but in Argonne where German attacks were as unsuccessful as previously.

Sealing Inquiry.

At 2 p.m. the enquiry was resumed. Present were Sir William Horwood, Chief Justice and the Hon. Justices Emerson and Johnson as well as Hon. R. A. Squires, Minister of Justice, and Dr. Lloyd. Capt. Westbury Keon, of the N. C. O. Chetrons, and George Tuff, who was sent by Capt. Keon in charge of the men and a number of survivors of the tragedy were waiting to be examined. Capt. Keon was examined by Mr. Squires and the articles of the ship and a plan of the scene of the disaster was put in. Mr. Squires continued his examination until half past five, on all that happened during three days of the tragedy. Then Dr. Lloyd further examined Capt. Keon. Shortly after 6 p.m. an adjournment was taken until 3 this afternoon when Dr. Lloyd will continue his examination. Dr. Lloyd is retained by the Crown.

The stripes were then presented by Mrs. P. F. Power, wife of the Magistrate, who pinned the chevrons on the arms of the recipients.

Rev. Father McGrath then addressed the lads congratulating them on the honours attained, and pleasantly referred to the excellent discipline that was maintained since the formation of the Company.

Mr. P. F. Power, Chairman of the Committee of Management, made a stirring address, expressing himself highly pleased with the excellent knowledge of drill shown by the lads. He referred to the number from the Company who are now at Salisbury Plains, and felt that when more are required the Bell Island Cadets will nobly respond to the call of duty.

Mr. R. D. Walsh, Secretary of the Committee, also addressed the boys, congratulating them on the honours received, after which he moved a vote of thanks to Capt. Murphy which was accorded by acclamation.

The Chaplain recited prayers for the Volunteers, the Company presented arms, and the "salute" sounded. The singing of the National Anthem brought the enjoyable proceedings to a close.
