FODDER INSUFFICIENT.

LONDON, To-day. It is estimated that a quantity of fodder stuff in Great Britain is insufficient to maintain the existing stocks of animals and poultry until the present season crop is available in September. The Secretary of Agriculture announced to-day that plans were being considered for the rationing of all classes of live stock of which milk cows and work horses would receive a major portion of the available supply.

STRIKE AT KIEL.

LONDON, To-day. A despatch under date Jan. 28, says that a thoroughly trustworthy report from Kiel declares the workers in the torpedo factory at Friedelshorst struck work on Friday, and in consequence of this a number of the men's leaders are being called to join the army. The employees at German dockyards struck Friday, the despatch adds.

RAID REFUSED.

LONDON, To-day. The official statement from British headquarters in France last night reads: Early this morning the enemy attempted a raid on one of our posts south of the River Scarpe under cover of a heavy barrage. The raiding party was repulsed with loss without entering our trenches.

BRITISH GUNBOAT SUNK.

LONDON, To-day. The British torpedo gunboat Hazard, 1,070 tons, was sunk in the English Channel Jan. 28th as a result of collision. The Admiralty announces three men were lost.

AERIAL OPERATIONS.

LONDON, To-day. An official statement on aerial operations issued by the War Office last night reads: Good visibility on Monday enabled much aviation work, in conjunction with the artillery, and also some photography to be carried out. British airmen dropped 400 bombs on various objectives including Roulers, Menin and the airfield near Tournai. Several thousand rounds were fired at enemy troops from machines. In air fighting throughout the day, two hostile machines were shot down and six brought down out of control.

THE AIR RAID.

LONDON, To-day. A large number of the persons killed in Monday night's air raid, according to Central News, met their deaths in a building, the basement of which was used as a shelter. It is believed that two bombs struck the building as the walls were blown out in large sections and all the floors collapsed. In addition to the persons from the outside being sheltered in the building there was a large staff at work at the time of the raid. This accounted for the serious mortality. Although a number of bodies have been recovered it is feared that others are still buried in the debris.

LAW SOCIETY.—At a meeting of the Law Society Mr. W. R. Howley was elected a Benchman, Mr. John A. Barron was admitted to the Bar and Messrs. F. R. Emerson, Leslie R. Curtis and Thos. F. McGrath passed very successful examinations in their 4th, 2nd and 1st intermediate examinations, respectively.
