

There is a preliminary period of 75 days during which voluntary enlistment is permissable under a late order from Gen. Crowder to all selection boards to discontinue inducting British subjects into the American army; to see that all British and Canadians in the United States, whether declarants or otherwise are given an opportanity during this period to enlist in the British or Canadian armies.

The British and Canadian Recruiting Mission has been informed that the drafting of all British subjects batween the ages of 20 and 44 years who have not enlisted in the British or Canadian armies, will begin in 75 days. They will then be taken into the United States army and probably placed in Class 1 of the American


