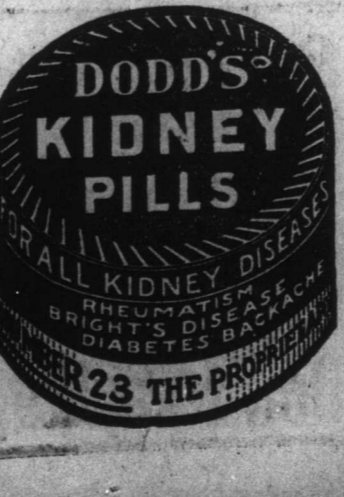

Hun Fiends and Our Prisoners.

SAVE OUR MEN. The Government to-day (Oct. 15) publishes a report by Mr. Justice Younger upon the treatment by the Germans of the British prisoners taken during the enemy's offensives this year. It is a terrible document and it contains evidence of bestial cruelty. What it shows is that the Germans when they thought they were winning deliberately and systematically set to work as one of them said to a British prisoner, "to break your brave English hearts." Our men were deprived of medical treatment, savagely assaulted by German doctors, starved, placed close to the firing line, stabbed, beaten, and tortured till many of them died. Two of them came to men who meant to escape with the piteous cry to them, "For God's sake try and get England to do something to help us to get out of this hell."

Lord, it was a long road, a long road and a dreary. From Mons unto La Cateau all on a summer's day. An overwhelming flood behind and we so faint and weary. That men were sleeping as they walked or drooping by the way. How we stuck it, goodness knows, that nightmare of retreating. Sorted by divisions when we halted for a spell. Still the Old Conscriptibles they took a lot of beating. It was here, La Cateau, that we turned and gave 'em hell! Fifty months of war, no less! Fifty months of striving. Now the time has come for us to make the Boches run. If there's any left of old von Kluck's command surviving. Let 'em try conclusions now it isn't ten to one.

A Damning Document.

Dr. Solf, the German "Colonial" Secretary, recently cited as one of the reasons why the Germans must recover their colonies at the end of the War "the merits which they have shown in history in the protection of the coloured races entrusted to their care," and also spoke of Germans "respecting humanity in the coloured races." Some insight into the manner of Germany's "protection" can now be obtained from a Report on the Natives of South-West Africa and their treatment by Germany, issued as a Blue Book. The German administrators and German practices stand convicted by the statements of Germans themselves; and the details brought out, by the evidence of some of those who survived their regime of organised barbarism, complete the picture. To those who know neither Germany nor the Germans, but are inclined to imagine that colonies are indispensable to Germany and that she must, therefore, be allowed to retain some of her former overseas possessions, we would commend this trenchant narrative. Germany's surplus population has of late been absorbed in her home industries, and the volume of "voluntary" emigration to her colonies has always been negligible. Her African empire was an artificial in its growth as her attempted colonisation of Pacific islands. Europe may have been ignorant, at that time, of what was taking place in German South-West Africa, but it can plead this excuse no longer. To hand back to Germany a square mile of territory, which would entail the return of a single native to German jurisdiction, would make the Allied Powers partners in German guilt, and would be tantamount to condoning, let us say, the massacre of 60,000 Hereros.—United Empire.
