SHAMEFUL, SHODDY CONTROVERSY.

LONDON, Sept. 19. The Daily Express, commenting on Lord French's preface in a second edition of his book, in which he endeavours to refute former Premier Asquith's assertion, and prefers to leave the shameful, shoddy controversy where it stands, says, "we cannot guess what evil genius prompted French to begin his babbling, which has shaken what were firm foundations of his countrymen's esteem and gratitude." The Times and Daily Mail support Lord French's accusation while the Daily News supports Mr. Asquith. Other leading newspapers leave the renewal of the controversy alone.

UNDER MARTIAL LAW.

CORPUS CHRISTI, Sept. 19. Censorship of official and private telegraphic despatches from Corpus Christi, went into effect at noon today, when the city and county were placed under martial law, through a proclamation by the Governor, following the terrific storm.

CANADA MUST ACCEPT AT ONCE.

LONDON, Sept. 19. Some time ago the Belgian Government presented Canada with a splendid site at the Menin Gate of Ypres for the erection of a Canadian Hall of Records as a memorial to the Canadians who were fighting in the Ypres salient. The French Government offered several acres of Vimy Ridge for the same purpose. It is learned that the Mayor of Ypres has written, intimating that while he has been instructed to locate a site for the purpose, says he has not yet heard whether the Canadian Government intend to accept the gift of the Belgian Government, and is also unaware whether the French offer will be accepted. Unless something is done without delay, these sites may pass under the control of the British Imperial authorities.

GERMANY COMPLETES.

BERLIN, Sept. 19. The Committee on Foreign Affairs of the National Assembly has decided, according to the Tagblatt, to nullify Article 61 of the constitution, by which Austria would be given representation in Germany's Reichstag. Kurt von Lersner, head of the German delegation at Versailles, has been instructed to inform the Entente Powers that the demand of the Peace Conference, relative to Article 61 will be complied with.

CUNARDS GET IMPERATOR.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19. Announcement that the former Hamburg American lines steamship Imperator, one of the largest ships in the world, has been acquired by the Cunard Steamship Co. from the British Ministry of Shipping, was made here to-night. The Imperator, which stayed at Hamburg during the war, and was used for carrying home American troops after the armistice was signed, is now docked here and being refitted for passenger service. She will be used, with the Aquitania and Mauretania, in providing a weekly service from New York to Cherbourg and Southampton.

A REPUDIATION.

ROME, Sept. 19. Premier Nitti answering the interpellation on the incidents at Fiume in the Chamber of Deputies to-day, said he had nothing to add to communications already given out, but wished to explain why his language had been rather strong in his previous statement regarding the affair. The Premier declared he saw the necessity to convince the Allies of the good faith of the Italian Government and to destroy any suspicion of connivance between Italy and the raiders.

BY A SMALL MAJORITY.

LONDON, Sept. 19. In a bye-election, held to-day in the Pontefract district of Yorkshire, the Coalition-Liberal candidate, W. F. Forrest won the seat over J. Burns, Laborite. Forrest polled 9,120 votes as against 8,445 for Burns.

A POLISH NAVY.

LONDON, Sept. 19. The organization of a Polish Navy, to become operative with the ratification of the Peace Treaty, is proceeding rapidly, according to advices from Polish sources. The fleet will consist, according to the present plans, of four armoured cruisers and twelve large torpedo boats. It will have a personnel of 3,500 including 110 officers and will be probably under the command of Admiral Porebski.

ROUMANIANS DESPOLING HUNGARIANS. BUDAPEST, Sept. 18. Reports indicate the continued withdrawal of the Roumanians, who are taking with them almost everything movable on which they can lay their hands. It is learned from the lines that they have been seizing jewelry from the women and children and confiscating live stock, fodder and agricultural implements.

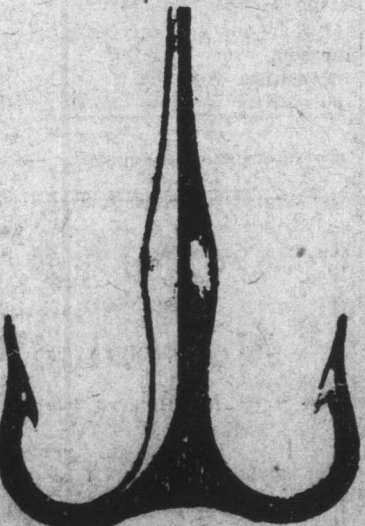

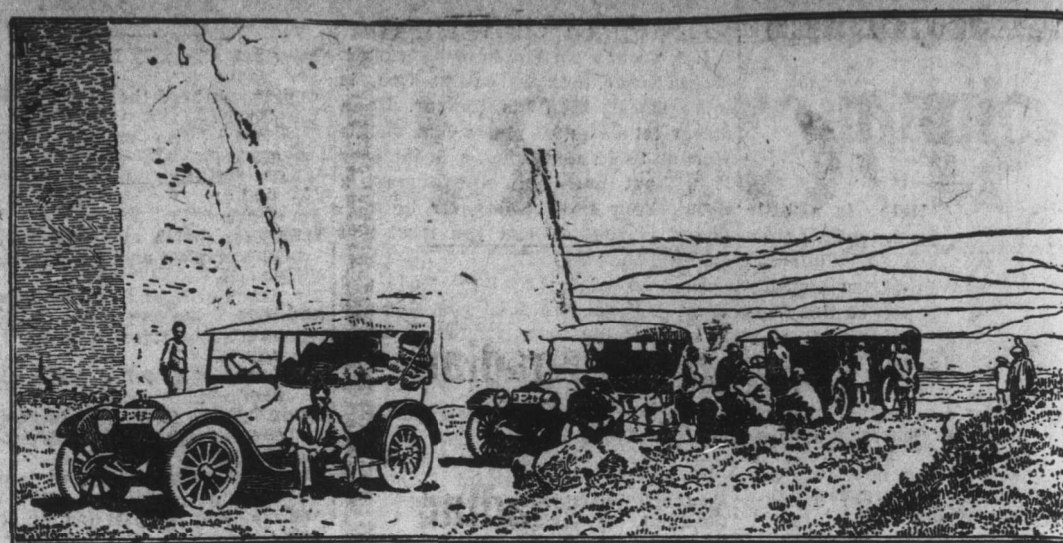

"The New Ship of the Desert"

Far away, in a remote and little heard of corner of China, just below the Siberian border, glisten the sun-bleached sands of the Gobi Desert.

Desolate, void of vegetation, and almost void of human beings, excepting for Mongol nomads, warlike and romantic in the extreme, it has for many centuries thrown an almost impassable barrier across the way between the important cities of Peking and Irkutsk.

Travellers, if daring enough, might cross the six hundred miles between the two points by camel caravan. But the tales told of the desert, with its trail marked by little heaps of bones, cleaned of flesh by fighting dogs and howling wolves, and whitened by a gleaming sun, were too forbidding to the average person, and a more circuitous route was usually taken.

Impossible as it seemed to shorten the trip between Peking and Irkutsk—unlike as it was that any mode of communication might be established between these two places excepting that furnished by the

picturesque, but tortuously slow, camel, the Chinese Railway Commission determined that it must be done, for the Gobi Desert had too long restricted the progress of commerce and civilization.

The automobile furnished the only other practical means of navigating the arid waste, and so experiments were made to determine the value of this solution of the problem. One make of car after another was tried, and the stranded automobiles which loom up like gravestones to an unsuccessful endeavor prove the need of a car of extreme sturdiness and power.

In order to overcome the difficulties which were presented by this route, it was necessary to secure a car which would bear the brunt of travelling through deep sands, scorching hot; over rocky passes, treacherously jagged; and through hub deep mud and flowing rivers.

It appeared impossible, but just as the attempt seemed on the verge of failure, the right car was tried, and so, at last, was discovered

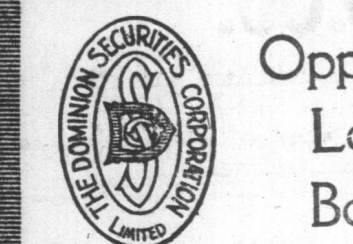
