Oldest Tune in the World

"For He's a Jolly Good Fellow," is said to be the oldest tune in the world. The origin of the air is lost in antiquity but it is supposed to have been learned from the ancient Babylonians by the Egyptians, who popularized it in Africa, and Asia Minor Arabs still sing it. The Crusaders caught the tune from their Saracen enemies, and sang it under the walls of Jerusalem. The air was ultimately carried into Europe, where it survived, in various forms, among the folk songs of the

different nations. In 1709, after the defeat at Malplaquet, the French, following a false rumor of the Duke of Marlborough's death in battle, composed a satirical lament, "Malbrook is Off to the War." Like most topical songs, this one was of short-living popularity, but in 1751 it suddenly echoed from one end of France to the other. The young Marie Antoinette gave birth to an heir, and the baby prince's nurse used to put her royal charge to sleep with the old song of her village home, and as if by magic the song became the cradle of the day.

Local Items

From the Past.

The sailing sealing fleet clearing from St. John's, March 6, 1947, numbered 95 vessels.

In a fire at Lovey's, head of Theatre Hill, on this date, 1859, a member of the Phoenix Fire Brigade named Buckley, was killed.

An interesting case, arising out of the killing of seals before March 12th, was before the Courts in the year 1887 and 1888, when William Rhodes sued Capt. Alexander Fairweather for the offence. The case was dismissed March 6th, 1888.

Schr. Lottie, the last sailing vessel to prosecute the sealfishery out of St. John's, sailed on her voyage to-day, twenty-one years ago.

Obituary.

DR. F. S. STAFFORD.
Dr. Frederick S. Stafford, aged 64 years, died at his home, Allandale Road, at 10 o'clock last night. Death resulted from influenza, from which the whole of the deceased's family, with one exception, is prostrated. For 42 years Dr. Stafford has practised his profession as physician and surgeon, formerly at Twillingate and latterly in the city, where, with his sons, he established a wholesale and retail drug business. His wife, fourth daughter of J. B. Blanford, Stipendiary Magistrate, formerly of Twillingate, two sons, Bennett and Augustus, and two daughters are left to mourn, with whom the Telegram deeply sympathizes. The funeral takes place tomorrow afternoon.

Hockey "Sports."

Hockey fans of St. John's will be surprised to hear that a couple of the Halifax All-Veterans team demanded \$200 of the League last night before playing or even leaving the Hotel for the rink. This money was demanded by them on the plea that they had given up jobs to come down here and play, and they contended that they should get \$200 as compensation. This hold-up was not made until late in the evening, when the rink was rapidly filling with ticket holders, and it looks as if they waited purposely to use that fact as a leverage by which to obtain what they demanded—a gift of \$200, in addition to all their expenses—travelling and hotel. They even threatened not to play unless they got it. Needless to say the League did not give in. In justice to the captain and the balance of the All-Veterans' team, we would say that they had no part in this hold-up.
