The local Baseball League has been in communication with the baseball association at Grand Falls during the past week, and by the information conveyed the services of our local boys will commence at St. George's on August 21st will produce some very sparkling games and large crowds.

The correspondence received shows that the paper town has a very formidable aggregation, and it looks as though the city boys will have to get down to their mettle if they wish to hold their own against the laurels, which they have well established, from the inland side two years ago.

The Grand Falls League is composed of three clubs this year, and their playing this season is said to be far in advance of other years.

While the whole town is crazy over the game, large crowds have witnessed the various games which have been marked by good clean play, and have featured in timely hitting and clever fielding.

Parell, a new comer for Grand Falls since last year, comes to St. John's well recommended as a ball player. The fielding of this boy in the left field gardens has been one of the outstanding features in the games this season, while his hitting has also been a feature. The watching of this boy in action will be alone well worth the admission. Several other players added to their ranks are also coming along for a first time.

Back Hannaford, pitcher; Cliff McMorris, 2nd base; Roy Petrie, John Brown and Ab Carter who compose the outfield, while Sebat Foran, Arthur Cohen, Captain of the team, Harry Pitcher, Albert Crawley and Pop Dean who are well known to local fans comprise the full line-up.

Pop Dean is said to be hitting the old pill in wonderful fashion, while Carter who starred at short stop for the visitors on their last appearance is still playing a good game.

With this in view the local selectors have lost no time in getting together and arranging for a team. Charlie Quick, of the Red Lions, has been elected Captain, and will have his post out this afternoon at 4 o'clock for a stiff work-out. It is to be hoped that as many players as possible from the various clubs will be present. President Orr will be on the field and assist in the batting practice. Our boys will no doubt need several work-outs, judging by the above report, to get in preparedness for what is expected to be a hot inter-town series. Owing to the cricket match being on in the afternoon, the ball players are asked to take the field at the rear of the eastern goal. As many players as possible are asked to kindly turn out.

MARITIME RECORDS.
Eric Smith of Halifax equalled the Maritime record of ten seconds for 100 yards at Dartmouth A.A. on Aug. 6th. Crescent officials plan to seek recognition of Smith's performance.

Grant Holmes won the 440 yards and 1 mile events, in 53 seconds and 4:17, respectively. In the 5 mile event, Marie Jackson, Imperial, led the field from the start and won out in 25 mins. and 15 seconds.

LOCAL CHAMPION ARRIVES.
Jack Bell our local long distance running champion who left here for Dublin four weeks ago to compete in the Irish Olympic arrived by the S.S. Digby yesterday morning and looks quite well after his trip. Since Bell left here his holiday has been one of experience. After arriving in Liverpool he took boat for Dublin, and

while proceeding up the Irish Channel he was informed by one of the ship's crew that the Olympic had been postponed owing to the troublesome times there. Arriving at Dublin he secured private residence at Mount Joy Square where he remained for 2 days. While there he had the pleasure of viewing the stadium where the proposed games were to be held. Bell said it was a huge structure, one end alone which had been recently built could seat 40,000 people. After two days stay he left for Liverpool where he remained until the Digby was ready to leave. He enjoyed the sea trip immensely both going and coming, fine weather all the way, though much fog was encountered on nearing this coast.

RIFLE SHOOTING.
The fifty-fourth annual prize meeting of the Nova Scotia Rifle Association held at Bedford Ranges last meeting proved to be the finest met in the history of that association, the list of entries was far in advance of any previous one and the prize list was the best yet competed for. Mr. J. W. Morris of our city was a competitor in the various shoots and made a most creditable showing considering that he had not handled the rifle for over four years. Mr. Morris' performance has already been made known by messages received through the press, but later papers received from Halifax give a fine account of his work on the last day of the shoot. He led the entire field for the Grand Aggregate Prize, but although he received first money, he was ineligible for the cup, which went to Q.M.S. C. A. Wood whose total score was 395. In the final stage for the Merchants Cup, Mr. Morris came third scoring 160 out of a possible 180. It is hoped the St. John's Rifle Association will be up and doing next spring and run their meets on the same lines and run their affairs most successfully before the war came about. And not let a rifle range as made by the Nfld. Regiment during the war go to waste through scandalous vandalism as has been going on in the past. Target shooting is both invigorating and helpful and should not be allowed to die out, considering that we have now in our midst rifle shots of repute, who would be only too happy to participate, should the club be once again brought to a head.

Beside the Cup three gold medals will go to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd runners. The Cup, which is a mammoth one in size, is expected by the next English mail and will be placed on exhibition upon arrival.

The Saints defeated their opponents by 2 goals to 1, but the victory was not gained without a hard struggle. In the first period the score was equal each team notching up one goal. 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Evolution of the Postage System.

At the present time when postage has been increased, we are not likely to forget that before the Great War we could send a letter half round the world for a penny. The word comes from "posture," a Latin word meaning fixed, and is derived from the posts or fixed stages which were established all over the Ancient Roman Empire, where mounted men were kept in readiness to bear private messages or public news from one to the other. Herodotus tells us of a similar system of couriers which existed in ancient Persia, and Xenophon—400 B.C.—describes the postal system established by King Cyrus. A very complete postal system was in working order in China in the thirteenth century; Marco Polo says the stations were only three miles apart. The Aztecs, the ancient rulers of Mexico, had also a postal service carried on by foot messengers, with stations about six miles apart. But these seem to have been Government ones. In early times letters in England, whether public or private, were only sent by special messengers, though later on, carriers with strings of pack horses used to traverse the country, and would carry letters for a consideration. In Edward I's reign posts were established all over the country, where horses could be hired by those wearing the Royal Livery, and in the next reign private individuals were also allowed to hire post horses. In 1548 a law was passed enacting that the charge for the horses should not exceed 1d. a mile—a penny being a far larger sum in those days than now—and in 1581, there was a "Master of the Posts," who might claim to be the first Postmaster General, though probably his duty was only to attend to the supply of horses. The first regular post was established by Charles the First, and the rates of postage were 2d. for a distance not exceeding 80 miles, 4d. up to 140 miles; any greater distance in England 6d., and from London to Scotland, 8d. Many improvements occurred from time to time, but the most important was the institution of mail coaches by John Palmer, who laid a scheme before the Government, and was appointed Controller to the General Post Office at a salary of £1500 a year; the Mail Coaches began to run in 1784 in face of great opposition, but in 1792 in consequence of disagreement Palmer was obliged to retire. He was offered £3000 a year in compensation, but fought the Treasury tooth and nail until 1813, when a grant of £20,000 was made to him. Mails were first carried by railway from Manchester to Liverpool in 1820. The Stamp Duty on Newspapers was reduced on August 13, 1858, and in 1840 the present system was introduced.
