In 1865, built the fine structure destroyed recently. All through its years of service the church had played a prominent part in the history of Montreal. Thousands of young, eager churchmen were ordained within its sacred precincts, many of them have since risen to high ecclesiastical rank.

RELINQUISHED THE ARMY.

In late years the army and the church again joined hands in the shadow of Trinity walls when Rev. Canon J. M. Almond, director general of chaplain's services of the C.E.F., assumed charge of the church and directed a small but important congregation in the big district which had grown up around the church.

Two years ago the church was to have been sold to the Franciscan order of the Roman Catholic Church, for the sum of \$125,000. This transaction, however, was not carried through and the church remained in the hands of its old congregation until, with the steady growth of the west end of the city and the migration of Protestant church people from central districts, the building was abandoned for a new house of worship in Notre Dame de Grace and it was sold to the Syrian church. The purchase sum is said to have been \$100,000. The Syrian authorities had decided to change the name of the church to St. Saviour's, and to dedicate it to St. Saviour's day.

The sorrow of the Roman Catholic church at the serious loss from fire was expressed by Mgr. Gauthier, administrator of the Archdiocese. Rev. Father Simon Nasre, pastor of the church, is expected to confer with Rev. Father Gauthier regarding the action to be taken to replace the church and to care for the congregation which was to have occupied it. Montreal Daily Star.

Papered Home With Postage Stamps.

Stories have recently been told of Russian homes that have been papered with ruble notes because they cost less than wall paper, but now comes a story of a United States storekeeper, Abraham F. Thomas, of Simon's Town, who after collecting stamps of any and all varieties which he could lay his hands on for seventeen and a half years has papered part of his house with them, working them into the most artistic and graceful designs.

Mr. Thomas worked along quietly at nights. He spent weeks in simply sorting and classifying his stamps according to color. Then still further months were spent in preparing his designs. Now he has the satisfaction of displaying the result of his patience and handiwork to hundreds of sightseers who have heard of his most artistic achievement.

On entering the rooms thus decorated, the general impression is of a somewhat novel design in wall paper, and only a closer examination reveals the fact that over half a million postage stamps have been painstakingly used to secure the pleasing effect.

The stamps used are "the common or garden" variety, but they are many colored. Among them are English Dutch, Colonial, German, American, French, Japanese, Russian, and a few Italian stamps. They have been arranged according to their colors and not according to the country of their origin.

The surface of the walls is covered with a sort of paint enamel and upon a large area of this stamps have been arranged in double-colored squares. Around the lower portion of the walls runs a deep dado made up of three distinct designs. The first and second represent vases containing

arum lilies, roses, forget-me-nots and Table Mountain glens, and the third represents a swan, graceful in line and in true proportion. The roof ceiling is also decorated with stamps in striking designs, these being divided from the walls by a narrow border of disas running flush with the angle. The combined effect is astonishing, so carefully planned is the whole arrangement, and so delicate the blending of the colors.

Mr. Thomas' customers, who knew he was collecting them, brought him stamps, people in other townships, who were aware of his plans, sent him stamps. Children peeped in at the door and brought him stamps.

For thirteen long years he patiently and steadily amassed used envelopes, and at the end of that period he decided to commence the work of "papering." In his spare time he drew up designs and mounted the stamps on stiff paper, and for eight months he put in two or three nights a week in his bedroom.

He had covered three of the four walls when he ran out of stamps, and had to start collecting again. Months elapsed before he was able to recommence his task, but eventually he did so, and completed it, using altogether over 48,000 stamps.

REWARD OF ACHIEVEMENT.

Then, proud of the finished article, he invited the inspection of his friends, who were enthusiastic in their praise. He there and then decided to tackle the hall which was an altogether bigger task. In the first place the area to be covered was much greater, and in the second the ceiling, high and long, presented many difficulties. Eighteen months were taken up with the preparation and in all two and a half years were spent in completing the work. Mr. Thomas devoted practically the whole of his leisure time to this hobby, and neglected almost every other form of recreation while the work was in progress.

"This ceiling half killed me," he observed. "I sometimes worked for hours and then destroyed all that I had done because it was not symmetrical."

Anyhow, the work was finished, and Mr. Thomas has arranged further work of this nature for himself and proposes shortly to commence "papering" another room.

As they stand the stamps are unclassified and heterogeneous. The good stands beside the bad, the young beside the old, the sweet beside the foul.

Nevertheless, they are an interesting thing long since dead! A halting and wonderful collection. Ghosts a million courtiers of the past!


AIN'T WE GOT FUN! NOPE! Turn backward, Oh backward, Time in thy dash; And gimme some cash again, Gimme some cash.

Historic Trinity Laid in Ruins.

ANGELICAN CHURCH INMEDIATELY LINKED WITH MILITARY LIFE HERE FOR OVER HALF A CENTURY—HAD JUST BEEN BOUGHT BY SYRIAN CATHOLICS.

Trinity Church, at the St. Denis entrance to Vier square, three-quarters of a century old and one of the most notable Anglican churches in Canada, was practically destroyed when it swept it for six hours, causing a property loss estimated at \$100,000.

All that remains of the building is outside line of walls. Its tower crumbled and fell on the body of the church. Rib-like rafters, interspersed with gaps, are all that are left of the roof.

The fire is believed by officials of the department to have been caused by the overheating of the furnace.
