The British Election

Nov. 28.—(By Canadian Press.) The British General Election, which sprang so suddenly upon the people of the United Kingdom last week, has now been decided.

The contest was unusually short and it is probable that the result of the vote will be decided in another matter.

The claims of probable success made by the party in power, the Conservatives, also by the Liberals, and likewise by the party, but to independent observers it looks like a scramble in which anything may happen on election day.

The return of the government of Premier Stanley Baldwin, who has been in power since the last election, is a possibility.

The Liberal Party, or of the party, or of a split-up of the party, may have sufficient strength to form a government without the aid of some other group or group of members of another group. At the same time, it is anyone's guess.

On polling day on December 6, it is expected that the political parties will be very lively, and they appear to be so. They are rushing the working candidates in the field at the last possible moment. This is a big task on such a short time as there were comparatively few candidates already chosen by any party at the time the House of Commons was dissolved, November 10.

The date of the election official is set for December 6. There are 615 seats in the House of Commons to fill, which is probable in the neighborhood of 300,000. It is expected that the Conservative party and the Liberal party will have about 480 candidates each.

The parties on the day of the dissolution of the House of Commons were as follows: Conservatives, 342; Labour, 144; Liberals (comprising 58 Asquiths and 59 Lloyd Georgians), 123; other parties, 7; vacant seats, 4.

The Conservative party's majority was 73. In 1922, the Conservative party, with Bonar Law at its head, won into power with a majority of 10. The standing of the parties was: Conservatives, 347; Labour, 142; National Liberal, 59; Asquith Liberal, 59; Independent, 5.

Nationalist, 2; Sinn Fein, 1; total 615; government majority 73. Since then there have been some changes, with the result that the Conservative majority in the House at present is 73, as stated.

The last general election was unusually tame. It followed the dramatic resignation of Lloyd George from the premiership and the Conservative party's selection of Bonar Law as premier only a short time previously to the election, and was merely a fight by the party newly in power to stay in and a fight by the Lloyd Georgians to regain the position they had lost, while at the same time a feud between the Georgians and Asquithians was raging and each faction of the split Liberal party was trying to down the other.

In the present contest the issue is clearly defined as between the Conservatives and Liberals, the two warring wings of the Liberal Party having come to amicable terms and battling side by side for victory, the issue being protection versus free trade. On the tariff question, which involves the Baldwin Government's offer to the Dominions at the recent Imperial Conference of a preference along certain lines, the premier has made it clear that his protective proposals do not mean a tax on wheat or meat. Both H. H. Asquith and Lloyd George are opposed to protection out-and-out and they are fighting the government party on this issue with all their strength.

The Labour Party's appeal to the electorate is a challenge of the government's tariff policy and the whole conception of economic relations underlying it, and a claim that a remedy for unemployment can be found through the operation of national schemes for productive work, with adequate maintenance for those who cannot obtain employment to earn a livelihood for themselves and their families. Labor's platform also includes the much-talked-of capital levy.

Former premier H. H. Asquith is the titular leader of the reunited Liberal party in the contest, and Lloyd George is his recognized chief lieutenant. How long this relation of British two famous statesmen will continue is a problem for the future to solve. A considerable number of people think the solution is not far in the future, and the prediction is freely made that it will not be long until Asquith retires from the arena of active politics and Lloyd George heads the party. It was in 1916 that the latter succeeded Asquith as premier. Ever since, until a week or so ago, they have been political enemies.

Buffalo and Hunters' Paradise

PLANNED ON PEACE AND SLAVE RIVERS.

EDMONTON, Alta., Nov. 26.—Next spring 2,000 young buffalo in the Wainwright Park will be rounded up and sent to the wood bison park in the Slave River County in batches of a hundred at a time, and four days after leaving their present home they will be following the deep cut trail after their distant relatives in the North have made all through the territory drained by the Lower Peace and Slave rivers.

Each week after the northern rivers are open four cars, each containing 25 of the young buffalo, each will be sent forward on the A. and G.C. railway to Waterways. Here they will be unloaded into specially built corrals and driven down a chute to a heavily fenced-in flat-bottomed scow on which they will travel to their destination. Forty-eight hours after they leave Waterways the hundred head will be put ashore on the banks of the Slave River, in the wood bison park. And will doubtless lose no time in getting back into the bush and away from the river traffic.

In their new home they will have 10,000 square miles in which to multiply. The growth of the two wild herds of buffalo in that park—the only real wild ones left on the continent—proves that the habitat selected for the Wainwright animals is suitable, and north men interviewed are of the universal opinion that Hon. Charles Stewart's plan is unique and simple, while indirectly it can be made to pay handsome profits and add materially to the present scanty sources of revenue in the Northwest.

Saved From Starvation.

Owing to the overcrowding of the Wainwright Park, unless the plan advocated by the Minister of Interior was adopted, the yearly slaughter of a considerable number of buffalo would be necessary, but by shipping them into the north an immense herd

will be built up for the use of future generations.

After a year of two in the northern fastness the Wainwright buffalo will be just as wild as their relatives already there and from the tourist traffic alone Edmonton and the north should benefit. Even now a number of applications from American tourists have been received by the Dominion Government, for permission to shoot buffalo in the north. These applications have been refused, but with the increased northern herds by the addition of several thousand within the next few years, a different attitude may be adopted.

Grant wealthy Americans a license to kill one buffalo at \$500 per head, and a fund would be immediately available for administration of the Northwest Territories and for much needed improvements in the far north, residents say. The buffalo will be there, as well as the wild atmosphere, pack trains, guides, Indians, and all other eccentrics dear to the heart of the city sport and a well-founded belief is current that if this is done the north will become a tourist resort of the first rank. It is claimed also that it would solve the question of food for the Indians in a large measure. All the hunter needs are the heads and hides for trophies, and the native would be well pleased with a free supply of meat. Which, in the vicinity of the settlements, is yearly becoming less.

Immediately she gained the platform the Socialists began to heckle Lady Astor. To their remarks and jeering she retorted:

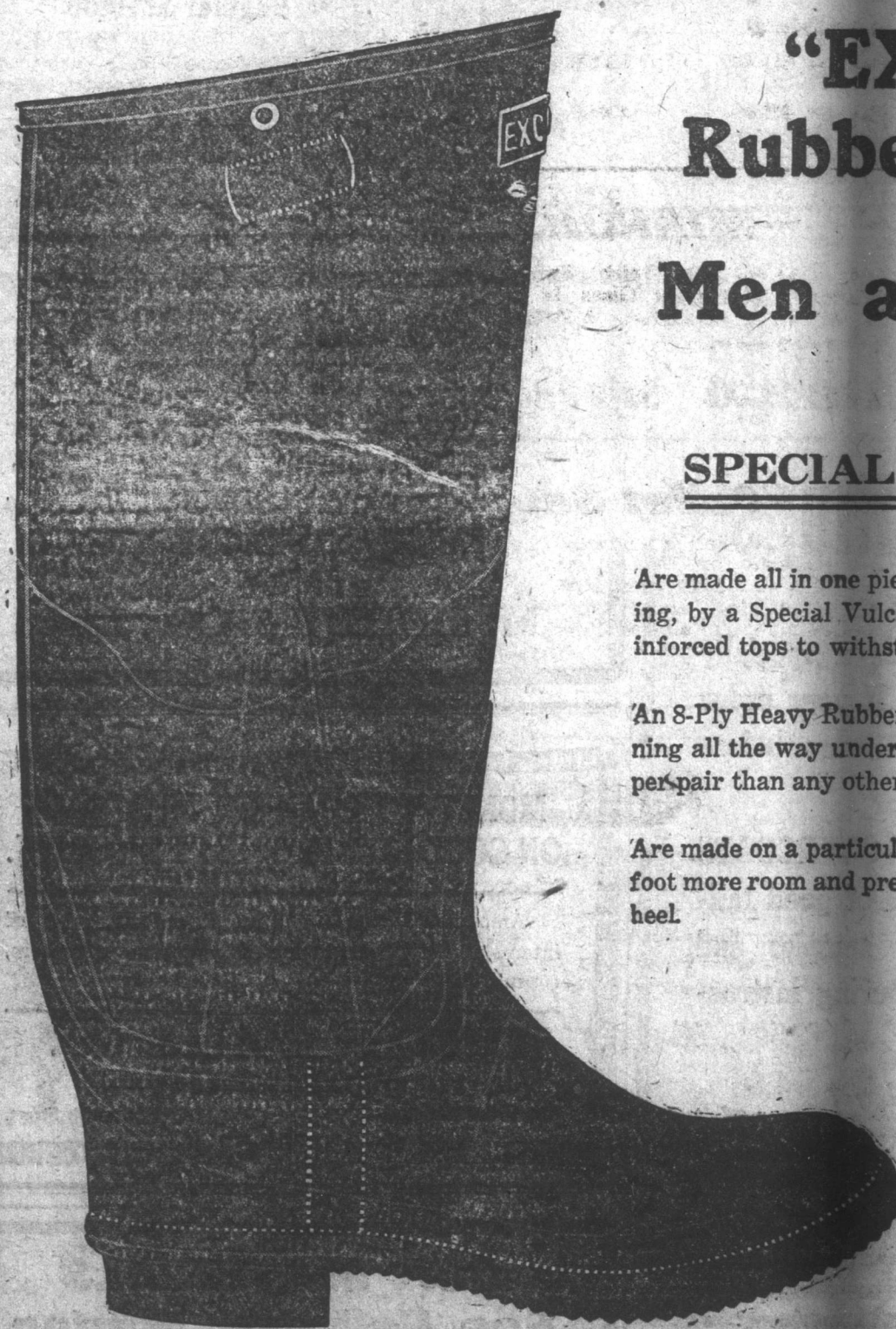
"If you want to turn all political
