Milk has been a common carrier of disease. Cows eating the Rhus toxicoden-dron get, writes Dr. Newsholme in Hy-giene, the "trembles," and their milk pro-duces serious gastric irritation in young children. The milk of goats fed on wild herbs or spurgeworts has produced severe disorders. The milk of animals suffering from foot-and-mouth disease, although frequently drunk with impunity, occassionally produces inflammation of the mouth—apthous ulceration. The milk derived from cows fed on grass from sewerage farms, is, per se, as wholesome as any other, and its butter has no more tendency to become putrid than that detendency to become putrid than that derived from any other source. The great danger in respect to milk is of its becoming mixed with tainted water, or of its absorbing foul odors, or the more dangerous but possibly less perceptible emanations from drains or sewers, when exposed in an ill-ventilated room. The absorptive power of milk for any vapour in its neighborhood is shown by exposing it
