COULDN'T COUNTAIN GAMBLING

Reasons Alleged for the Pope's Determination to Remain in Rome.

Rome, Sept. 2.—It is asserted that ex-Premier Crispi will presently publish documents intended to demonstrate that France desired to have the Pope leave Rome in 1889. It is learned at the Vatican that any such statement would be quite without foundation, and that consequently, in case proved to have been misinformed. It is a fact that the Pope did, in 1889 form the intention of leaving Rome. His first idea was to go to Spain, but when he considered that it would be in comparative isolation in that remote country, he abandoned that idea and entered into negotiations with the Prince of Monaco, the situation of whose territory was to be made, the apartments for the Pope were designated, when a letter of extreme importance was received from the Prince making certain conditions relative to the Pope's residence. The conditions were such that the Pope could not accept, and a representative was dispatched to Monaco with the hope of securing some compromise, but the plan fell through. But France had nothing whatever to do with the matter. Signor Crispi had his suspicions that something was going on, but he did not succeed in getting a correct idea of what it was.

PAYMENTS OF MISSIONARIES.

In the Dominion House of Commons the other night:

Sir Richard Cartwright, on the vote for the Indians of New Brunswick, called attention to the fact that \$1,016 was paid last year to missionaries, and asked an explanation. It occurred to him that the missionaries might be better employed nearer home.

Mr. Dewdney said that was a bonus to clergymen who had been doing special work among the Indians. Of what denomination are these missionaries?

Mr. Cartwright—They are all Roman Catholics.

Sir Richard Cartwright—This is a department with which the House should have been acquainted. This should have been brought down as a special vote. Out of \$8,000 spent among the Indians of New Brunswick \$1,000 have been appropriated for the payment of salaries of a number of clergymen. That was not contemplated by the House when the money was voted.

Clergymen in various parts of the Dominion have devoted a great deal of time to the spiritual welfare of the Indians. If we are going to pay these men, I do not know where you are going to draw the line. This is a question of considerable importance, and I would like to have further information as to how long these gentlemen have been paid, and what relations they occupy towards the Indians. Would it be a great deal better if the money was spent in providing food? No doubt their spiritual welfare was important, but the matter should be carefully considered, for other denominations would be claiming this privilege.

Mr. Dewdney said that in Nova Scotia most of the Indian agents were Roman Catholics. In New Brunswick there were two agencies, and the rest of the work had been done by these clergymen, who had received salaries for years back.

Sir Richard Cartwright said that when these facts were known there would be a number of applications made from various denominations which had been concerning themselves in looking after the Indians. He asked what the Government proposed to do about this matter in the future.

Mr. Dewdney said he would look into the matter. These clergymen appeared to be doing a certain amount of Indian work. The matter had not struck him before.

Mr. Campbell—How many Indians are there in New Brunswick?

Sir Richard Cartwright—I do not like this mode of smuggling votes for missionaries into the estimates without a distinct understanding as to the why and wherefore and all about it. We cannot recognize the spiritual needs of the Indians in one Province without recognizing them in another Province. The Government is preparing a difficult question to be solved in the future. How much of the vote this year is to go to clergymen?

Mr. Dewdney replied that he contemplated doing the same as last year, but would bring down further particulars later on.

The item was allowed to stand.

THE CENSUS.

(Montreal Witness.)

None but an inveterate pessimist would have predicted ten years ago that the decade should only 172,699 to the population of the extensive fertile regions of Manitoba and the Territories. And who would have thought that the rural population of such splendid farming countries as Huron and Wellington would have decreased over 20,000 in ten years?

Only have the rural districts suffered, as they naturally would, from a system of jagged protection, but what about the slow progress of Canadian towns and cities, expanding Montreal and Toronto with their suburbs? Here we see the greatest progress made by the cities of Winnipeg, Vancouver, Victoria and New Westminster, which have few precedents in history, while such manufacturing centers as Dundas, Colborne and Nanawana have actually declined in population. These changes, it will be answered, are naturally due to the centralization of industry which results from railway development. This is doubtless true, but it only robs us of our only remaining hope, namely, that of the splendid growth of Toronto and Montreal, seeing that the additions to these cities are not altogether advantageous to the industrial life of the country, but are in a measure obtained at the expense of the lesser towns.
