Orders have been telegraphed to the police of all Irish and English ports to watch for suspects.

The memorial consists of two stained-glass windows. One of them is divided by two mullions into three parts, while at the bottom of the other two is a medallion portrait of the minister, author and poet; on the three sections of the mullioned window are representations of an angel bearing a shield below the arms of the United States; the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers from the Maylower, and the figure of St. Botolph. On the other window are two figures of St Launfal, an angel bearing a shield below the arms of the United Kingdom and a figure of St. Ambrose as well as a symbolic representation of the emancipation of the slaves.
