Interesting Addresses by the Chief Head and Ruler and the Deputy Grand Master.

The Address. "To William R. White, Eq., Q.C., Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada, A., F. and A. M.: "Dear Sir and M. W. Bro.,—The Masonic fraternity of London extend to you a hearty and sincere welcome on this your first visit as grand master. We congratulate you, most worshipful sir, upon your advancement to the highest position n the gift of the craft in this jurisdiction, and we desire to express the belief that your worth and ability fully entitled you to

the considence thus reposed in you. "Being a resident of a distant part of the jurisdiction you are not in consequence so well known to your western brethren as many of your illustrious predecessors, but your high character as a citizen and the vidences you have already given of your ability as a wise and judicious ruler of the craft, has firmly established you in our hearts, and we trust your term of office may be a most prospercus one, and we have every confidence that the affairs of the craft will be administered with that same degree of judicial equity and intelligence which has hitherto distinguished your Masonic career.

"la conclusion we tender our sincere thanks for the henor you have conferred upon the craft in Lendon by this visit, and feel sure that it will result in a lasting benefit to Masonry throughout this section of the jurisdiction."

The Grand Master's Reply. M. Wor. Bro. White, who was received with many demonstrations of pleasure,

said: "Right worshipful sir and brethren of London,—There are, I suppose, many oc-casions in the life of most grand masters when they find considerable difficulty in fully expressing the feelings of their heart. This is one of those occasions, and it has come early in my official career. I have been for the past two days visiting other portions of the western part of the jurisdiction. I had the pleasure of dedicating a hall at St. Thomas on Monday and of attending a Masonic function-the

installation of the officers of Norfolk Lodge, No. 10-yesterday, and any of the brethren who have joined with these brethren in their celebrations will know what that means as far as physical endurance is concerned. (Laughter.) May I say to you and all the brethren of the city of London that it affords me the greatest possible pleasure to make my first official visit to this city under such auspicious circumstances? This is not my first visit to this good city. When I had the honor of being grand senior warden, in 1875, the Grand Lodge of Canada met in London. Then I was elected D. D. G. M. of the Ottawa district, in which I have my home-an honor which I then felt exceedingly proud of. And a little over two years ago I was elected deputy grand master at the meeting in London-a stepping-stone to the position which I tonight occupy. (Applause.) Brethren, you may feel assured that London is pleasantly associated with me as far as Masonic memories are concerned. To the brethren of London and of London district I owe a debt of gratitude, and I have come over 700 miles to, in some measure, repay that debt by attending this gather. ing. It is a subject of personal congratulation to me that I have been advanced to the proud position which I now hold. I may not be following in the footsteps of some of my predecessors, who gave you notice that they were coming, and told you to be prepared.
