Who Is to Blame?

The present crisis in China has served to bring the Chinese missionary prominently before the world, it being alleged by some that he is at the bottom of the disturbance. The Rev. Dr. Halsey, of Brooklyn, declared from his pulpit that: "The missionary had his share in fomenting this trouble and must bear his share of the blame. Some of the missionaries have been politicians as well as Christians, and this grasping, selfish attitude has helped to bring about the present condition."

The Rev. Dr. Macanthur, of New York, is reported to have said: "Those missionaries who combine civil authority with their religious instruction, are partly responsible for the condition of things in China."

Since the missionaries are arraigned by such prominent members of their profession, the origin of the trouble is worth reconsidering. It is true that they are to blame in the sense that had they not opened up the Celestial Empire to the beneficent influences of Christian civilization, there would have been no such disturbance; for the cause of the trouble is the friction between western innovation and stereotyped Chinese customs. The effect of Christianity upon the world ever since primitive times, has been the distintegration of pagan superstition and the supplanting of it by rational religion.
