pro tem. FIELD WORK. Mrs. E. S. Strachan, of Hamilton, field corresponding secretary, gave a running review of the field work of the year. In Japan there are four regular schools, with 189 boarding pupils and 204 day pupils; two orphanages with 24 children; two day schools for the poor, with 50 pupils; two night schools for the poor, with 78 pupils; two industrial schools with 40 pupils,

and two kindergartens with 120 pupils. There were 14 foreign missionaries 33 native teachers. An orphanage had been built at Kanazawa. Five new foreign workers were asked for, one of them be a trained kindergartner. The 20th century fund special services had had a great revival influence on the work. Some of the ladies in the West China field had started back to recommence work after the rebellion, but were stopped at Chungking until the interior was more settled. The French work was not marked by any special features. There had been 50 children in the Crosby Girls' Home during the year, and 83 patients, 23 whites and 60 Indians, in the hospital

at Fort Simpson. There was a request for a trained nurse at Morley. HOME MISSIONS. The home corresponding secretary, Mrs. G. P. McKay, Toronto, presented a very encouraging report. HELD AT BAY!

By the Brave Express Messenger

His Car Blown Open With Dynamite,

Eugene, Ore., Oct. 24.-The northbound Southern Pacific overland express, due here at 3:42 a.m., was held up by robbers near Walker's station, 15 miles south of here, at 3 o'clock yesterday morning, and the express car badly damaged, but the robbers secured little booty. Two men boarded the train at Cottage Grove as the

MITE.

After passing Walker's, which four miles from Cottage Grove, they climbed over the tender and covered Engineer Burt Lucas and the fireman and his helper with revolvers. The robbers ordered the train stopped, after which the fireman and helper were compelled to uncouple the train between the express car and the first coach. Engineer Lucas was then ordered to pull ahead, the fireman and helper being left behind. After going a short distance the train was stopped and the robbers proceeded to the express car, taking with them the engineer.

HELD THE FORT.

The express car was blown open with dynamite and Express Messenger Charles was ordered out, but he refused to go, and with his shot gun commanded the situation inside the The robbers told him to come out or he would be blown up with the car, but he replied "Blow ahead." A fusillade of bullets followed, riddling the car, but the messenger, who was uninjured, kept up a continuous fire from the inside, which held the robbers at bay. The charge of dynamite was then thrown into the car with a burning fuse. But Charles grabbed it and threw it outside, where it exploded. Next the robbers compelled the en-

gineer to crawl up to the opening, inside of the car, hoping to use him as a protection from the messenger's shots, but the messenger kept up steady fire over the engineer's head. and still held the robbers at bay.

WENT FOR THE MAIL. The robbers then gave up their efforts to secure the express treasure, and went for the mail. They secured the registered mail, then cut the engine from the rest of the train and ordered Engineer Lucas to pull ahead. They ran to Judkin's Point, on the outskirts of Eugene, where they disembarked and ordered the engineer to return and get his train. The train arrived here at 7:30, four hours late. The news was wired from Saginaw and officers were out in search of the robbers early this morning, but as yet


