Coach Stagg, of Chicago, Prepares
Five Changes for National
Rules Committee.

SUGGEST THREE DOWNS

Would Give Teams Trio of Chances to
Make Fifteen Yards.

United States rugby men are beginning to realize that they must come to the Canadian game or drop out of the game altogether. As it is a certainty that they will not adopt the latter course, coaches of team all over the States are doing up changes and figuring how the chances of injury to players can be lessened.

Coach Stagg, of the University of Chicago, has come out with five suggestions, the first of which means the adoption of a Canadian rule.

Adopt Canadian Rule.
Under present conditions teams across the border must make their yards on one down. In his new code he suggests that teams be allowed to choose to make ten yards, or following the Canadian idea three downs for fifteen yards.

Stagg, who is a director of the university, and a member of the national rules committee, intended to keep his recommendations to himself until the meeting of the conference committee tomorrow afternoon, but a special session of the athletic board caused him to change his mind.

Following the passing of a resolution by this body, after which Stagg was instructed to work for modification in the rules which may be calculated to make the game safer, the coach consented to make a statement of his position on football reform.

Makes Five Suggestions.
"As it looks to me," he said, "the ways of remedying the rules may be approached as follows:

1. Allowing two chances to make ten yards, or by reducing the distance to fifteen yards and giving a team three chances, as Walter Camp has suggested. In this way forward passing will be encouraged by making the use of the play more often necessary.

2. By prohibiting pushing or pulling of the runner with the ball, which now does lots of damage. Another single player now is often struck by the combined force of two or three men; and, second, it takes the combined strength of two or more men falling under or on top of the attacking players to stop them.

3. By making a penalty for crawling with the ball, which would encourage running up in running.

4. By increasing the penalty for piling on a player unnecessarily.

5. By emphasizing the need of the referee's blowing the whistle when the ball is stopped, thus preventing massing.

New York, Nov. 18.—According to Bob Murphy, who is stakeholder for the Jeffries-Johnson fight, not a single offer of the many that have been coming in for a month from all sorts of would-be promoters has been accompanied by the necessary certified check for \$5,000 as stipulated in the articles of agreement.

Murphy says that unless these offers are backed up with the required money before Dec. 1, they will be thrown in the waste basket to clear the way and save time for legitimate club promoters to put in their bids.

Bids Are Worthless.
When articles were signed, the fact that \$5,000 must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith was widely published, so that it is safe to say that the bids already received by the stakeholder are worthless.

As the time draws near to consider bids the impression grows that Jack Gleason and James Coffroth are the only promoters who will be regarded seriously by the pugilists and their managers, unless Thomas McCarey, of Los Angeles, comes across with an unexpectedly big offer.

FOOTBALL REFORM IS
DEMAND AT CHICAGO

Maroon Professors Start Crusade To
Make Gridiron Sport Safer.

Chicago, Nov. 18.—Football is in for another surgical operation. Members of the University of Chicago board of physical culture and athletics, at a special meeting yesterday branded the gridiron game as needlessly and prohibitively dangerous, and started action pending at important changes in the playing rules to guard against accidents.

The Chicago officials went on record as opposed to the game in its present form, and instructed
