



## MANUEL SAYS HE HAS CLEAR CONSCIENCE

Is Leaving Portugal But Does Not Mean to Abdicate.

Gibraltar, Oct. 11.—Before leaving Portugal, King Manuel sent the following autograph letter to the Portuguese premier:

"I am compelled, owing to stress of circumstances, to exonerate myself from the people of Portugal that my conscience is clear. I have always acted as a faithful Portuguese, and I shall have always done my duty. I shall ever remain at heart a true Portuguese, and hope that my country will do me justice and try to understand my feelings. My departure must in no way be taken as an act of abdication."

## NEW MINISTERS.

Lisbon, Oct. 11.—When elections are held, and a new president is chosen, Dr. Brito Comacho will become minister of war, and Dr. Menezes minister of marine. These two were primarily instrumental in engineering the revolution.

The crude green and red flag will be discarded, and the old Portuguese flag, but without the crown, adopted as the emblem of the republic. The Marquis de Soveral, the Portuguese minister at London, will be recalled.

It is reported that the war minister has ordered the entrenched military camp, which was to have been raised today, to be retained intact with all its artillery in readiness to repel any royalist attack.

It is stated that the Government will confiscate the king's property, but will respect Queen Amelia's fortune, which was inherited from her father.

Badajoz, Spain, Oct. 11.—A large number of monks and nuns, fleeing from Portugal, have arrived here. The under-secretary of the navy of the last Portuguese administration, also has reached Badajoz, after a flight across the border.
