TUBERCULOSIS CURE

Swedish Doctor Claims To Have Conquered Disease in Throat.

Stockholm, Oct. 29.-Medical men are investigating the claims of Dr. P. F. A. Nnenstill, who has introduced several patients, known to have had consumption of the throat, as cured. Among them is a young girl who was so ill that she could take no nourishment whatever.

The method pursued by the doctor is said to be very simple, following close ly upon Dr. Koch's method for fighting malaria. The doctor killed off the bacilli. The University of Upsala is investigating the claims.

BROKE RECORDS

New York's Ocean Commerce Passed Billion Mark.

New York, Oct. 29.-All records have been broken during the past year in the volume of shipping passing in and out of New York harbor. The value of the imports and exports of merchandise far exceeds that of any other year in the history of the port, reaching a total of \$1,587,977,314. The value of the nation's foreign commerce last year was \$3,315,372,508, so that New York handled just 48 per cent of the exports and imports.

Next in order, measured by the value of its commerce, ranks Boston, whose foreign commerce last year was \$199,522,973.

It is interesting to know that New York's imports of merchandise is valued at almost \$1,000,000,000, of 60 percent of the nation's total, while the exports were only a little more than half this figure, or 37 per cent of that of the United States. While New York's commerce has grown at an astonishing rate, the commerce of the country as a whole last year was a trifle under that of the previous

ELECTION AFTER THE CORONATION

Mr. Asquith May Announce Withdrawal of Parliament Bill Shortly.

A VERY BROAD SCHEME

Will Be Outlined To Bring Parties Together-Home Rule Question Is Big Feature.

New York, Oct. 29 .- A London dispatch received here indicates that opinion is gaining ground that the influence of King George, exerted legit-British parties, is the chief factor in the improvement in the situation created by the controversy over the status of the Lords in legislation.

It is now thought probable that a collapse of the Asquith-Balfour "council of eight" will be averted, that the general elections will be postponed be yond the coronation year, and that when Parliament meets on Nov. 15 Mr. Asquith will announce the withdrawal of the "Parliament bill," the Government measure to limit the Lords' vote.

"After you have delivered this, go to the gendarmes and tell them where they can find me. Claim the reward of 2,500 francs. That will keep you for the rest of your life." The old woman did as she was bid-

den. When the gendarmes broke into the house the brigand thew up both rands. "Don't shoot," he said. "I want to die by my own hand." At the same time he fired a bullet from a rifle hidden under the table. He pulled the
