FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

HAY PRICES COMING DOWN IN LONDON

\$12 75 to \$13 a Ton Paid on Market This Morning—Fruit Market Small.

Hay is easier on the local market. The prices paid this morning were mostly \$12 75 and \$13 per ton. Only a few loads were offered for sale and the market has not yet recovered from the drop in value last week-end. There is very little hay on the market. A few loads were yesterday brought from \$1 22 to \$1 30 per cwt. The reports now coming in are that previous crop stories were exaggerated and the low average of the season's crop are keeping the price of old hay from soaring very far above \$1 20 per cwt.

The fruit market this morning was very small. Plums were \$1 10 to \$1 15 per bushel. Tomatoes brought \$1 40 per basket. Black currants were still offered at \$2 00 per basket. There is an unusual scarcity of good butter at this time. The price of any kind of butter is not plentiful. The price is holding up so high that the commission merchants are not willing to handle very little butter, and then mainly creamery. As a matter of fact, the first class dairy butter brings a higher market price than the creamery brand. Eggs also are very firm in price. A large and active market may safely be looked for tomorrow.

WAVES MOUNTAIN HIGH

Vessel Was Almost Lost in the "Graveyard of the Lakes."

[Canadian Press.]
St. Catharines, Ont., July 28.—H. M. Goodman arrived home last night after going through an experience he will not care to have repeated. He was a passenger on the new steamer Geronia, of the Ontario and Quebec Transportation Company, which has just been built to run between Toronto and Quebec. She is a very light draught vessel, drawing only 5 1/2 feet of water, in order that she may navigate the St. Lawrence River. The Geronia left Collingwood Sunday afternoon on her maiden trip hoping to make Toronto in a couple of days.

She had on board a crew of about 60 and 50 or more passengers, of whom Goodman was one. A hurricane wind hit the province Tuesday came on the Geronia with all its force as she was steaming down Lake Huron, and the sea became so heavy that Captain Heffernan finally resolved, after getting about 70 miles down the lake, to turn back and try to make a port in Georgian Bay.

"The waves ran mountains high, and you can't possibly exaggerate their height and fury," said Goodman this morning to a representative of the Canadian Press. "How we ever got through I don't know." He described how, after battling with the giant waves for 24 hours Monday until 6 o'clock Tuesday morning, they finally reached Tobermory and were out of danger. The Geronia almost met disaster as she was trying to make the gap into Georgian Bay, well named the "Graveyard of the Lakes." Passengers and all of the crew but five were disabled with seasickness, and the steam ran down for lack of firemen. None of the passengers knew how near they were to death, but the captain was aware of the danger when there was no power to steer the vessel, and himself went into the stokehold for five or six hours.

The engine room staff also deserve the highest praise for what they did. It did not have been for them the ship would have been lost. Goodman said that it was the fiercest gale in the memory of the oldest navigator, and the Geronia was the only boat on the lake at the time. The Geronia is going through the Welland Canal this afternoon on her way to Toronto.
