Issues Statement in Reply to Mr. Bryan's Latest Speech.

Not Cease Because of Assassin's Bullet.

[Canadian Press.]

Chicago, Oct. 18 .- Col. Roosevelt awak ened at Mercy Hospital shortly before clock, full of vigor. His nurse hastened into the colonel's room, and was assured he had had a "perfectly good night." Campaign activities should not cease because of Col. Roosevelt's attempted assassination, so far as he is concerned, he said last night.

In a statement issued by Col. Roosevelt

at Mercy Hospital, in answer to what Mr ryan said in his speech at Franklin, Ind., 'I wish to express my cordial agreement
