Play Ball! This is the cry that will sound in four Ontario cities today, and will usher in the Canadian League season of 1912. And right here let it be said that it is going to be some season. Right from the drop of the hat until the last inning of the last game is played, the fans are going to see real baseball, and there is no doubt but that there will be as pretty a race for the pennant as any fan could wish.

The weather, which yesterday promised to put the fans in the opening game, cleared off nicely last evening, and although the air is a trifle chilly, Old Sol is doing his best to make a nice day of it. The grounds at Tecumseh Park are in splendid condition. They were as dry as a bone this morning. The infield, which has recently undergone great improvement, never looked better, and the rain was really a blessing in disguise, for it packed the loose dirt and made the base paths as hard and as level as a sidewalk. Everything is in readiness for the opener. No detail has been overlooked by the local management in making the occasion one of the most memorable in the history of professional baseball in London, and this old city has seen some memorable days. The grand stand presents many improvements over last season. The seats have all had backs put on them, and are just as comfortable as an easy chair. Nothing has been overlooked that will cater to the comfort of the fans, and more joy than merely watching the game will await the crowd at Tecumseh Park this season.

SOME PARADE—EH, WHAT!

The parade to the grounds will be a monster. The Seventh Regiment Band will dispense music for the occasion, and about fifty automobiles will form the procession, the London and Guelph players riding in one of the cars.

At the grounds, Mayor Graham will speak briefly and then dish up the first ball to Rev. J. C. Inkster, who will be adorned with glove and mask. Rev. Father McKenna will be at bat, and if the ball ever comes near enough for him to wallop, it will be a home run sure.

Manager Bowerman arrived in town last evening from his home in Toronto, where he spent Sunday. He was somewhat anxious about the weather, and would have preferred it a little warmer. However, he is pleased over the condition of his players, and is confident of taking the first game, at least, from Guelph. His line-up will be the same as announced in yesterday's Advertiser. It is not known whether Frank will play in the game himself or not, but it is likely he will. Powell will be played at first base, while Rieberman will camp out in right field. The team looks good, and the fans can be assured that there will be no such start as last season.

In the other cities of the league where the season opens today, enthusiasm is at fever heat. No brighter outlook could confront a minor league than the one that the Canadian League is facing this season. From Ottawa in the east to St. Thomas in the west, the Canadian League is attracting attention all over baseball Ontario. This season the organization is twice as strong as last season. Next year it will be stronger than ever, and so on. The Canadian League has come to stay. It is not only attracting attention in Ontario, but it is also being watched with interest across the border. It is a big advertising medium for the cities that compose its circuit, and it is going to be to Canada what the National and American Leagues are to the United States. Today it makes its initial bow as a Class C organization. The day is not far distant when the Canadian League will become a Class B organization, and be on a par with the best minor leagues across the line.

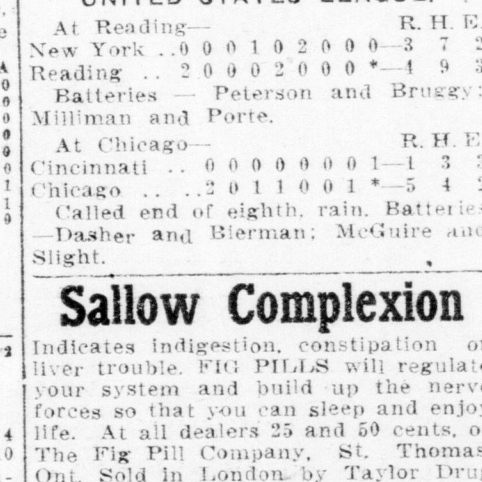

ENGLISH PRINCE AT FRENCH MANOEUVRES

Heir to the Throne Will Witness the Naval Exercises.

Paris, May 14.—The Prince of Wales, who has been staying for some time here with the Marquis de Breteuil, intends to leave for the great French naval station at Toulon, June 18, and will embark on the French Dreadnought Danton, the flagship of Vice-Admiral Augustin Boue de la Peyrere.
