BROCK MAULAY PUT OUT OF DINGWALL

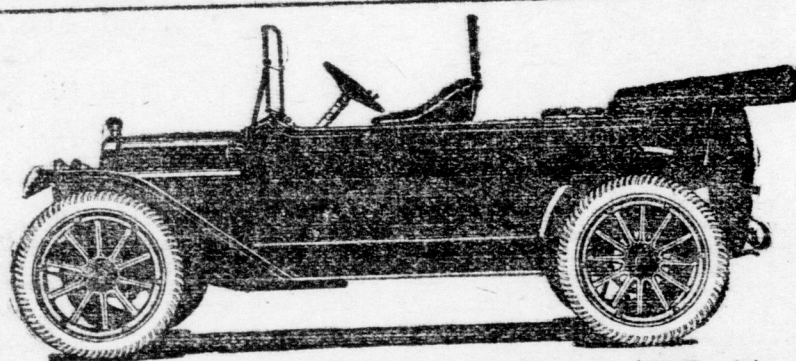
Famous Southampton Skip Lost by One Shot, to Rochon, of Winnipeg Thistles.
