

PETROGRAD TELLS
OF SOME SUCCESS

Attacks Repulsed and Several
Villages Taken From the
Enemy in Galicia.

BATTERING OF PRZEMYSL

Vienna Thinks Ozer's Forces
Must Soon Lose Posses-
sion of Fortress.

Petrograd, via London, June 3.—An official statement issued last night at the headquarters of the Russian general staff was as follows:

"In the Shavli region on Monday we repulsed successfully several attacks and captured a redoubt east of the village of Travilany."

"On the Narv front on the left bank of the Vistula the enemy on Tuesday delivered several attacks, which were repulsed."

"In Galicia on Monday, between the Vistula and Przemyśl, stubborn fighting developed, our troops gaining somewhat important successes on the left bank of the lower San, taking several villages and capturing a redoubt east of the village of Travilany."

"On the right bank of the San River we were successful near the village of Kalukow, taking a base south of the village of Kalukow, including 22 officers and eight quickfiring."

"Przemyśl was bombarded with heavy guns up to 15-inch calibre and the enemy delivered his principal attack against the north front in the region of Fort 10 and 11, which the Austrians had almost completely demolished before the surrender of the fortress."

"When we repulsed these attacks, the enemy succeeded in taking several of our guns, which had been bombarded the enemy's columns until the latter were driven back to the west and the last shell was spent. According to supplementary information we took 200 more prisoners and eight quickfiring."

"There has been no change between Przemyśl and the great marsh of the Danister."

"Between Lysymenitz and Striv the enemy, who had concentrated his artillery and reinforcements, achieved some successes in the course of the night by stubborn attacks with large forces. The fighting continued on Tuesday morning."

"On the right bank of the Bystron we took part of the enemy's position and made 150 prisoners."

VIENNA'S VIEW.

Vienna, via London, June 3.—The days of Przemyśl as a Russian fortress apparently are numbered, according to dispatches from the front. The capture of the fortress, which has been mentioned in official dispatches, Austrian 12-inch mortars and German 10-inch mortars are now pounding away at the fortress from the west and south fronts of the fortress. The besiegers are within striking distance of the works on the south.

The capture of the five forts in the northern sector brings the best of the intermediate circle of field fortifications which the Austrians erected in the interval between the second siege, and which the Russians since then have strengthened further. This girdle makes skillful use of all the inequalities of the terrain, but it is believed here will be able to offer only a brief resistance.

Still More Resolute.

There still is a brief line of defence—the inner girdle of redoubts, provided with guns, machine guns, wire entanglements and concrete pillboxes—but the Austrians are confident it will be incapable of withstanding a bombardment by heavy artillery.

The reports of military aviators indicate that the Russians themselves are of two minds regarding the defence of Przemyśl. While the Austrians are approaching the San River, and even after the campaign against the fortress began the Russian forces, ammunition and supplies into Przemyśl along the double track railroad from Lemberg. Who the besiegers approached within artillery range of the railroad and highway, the movement in this direction caused the Russians to supply an equally hurried rush of men and supplies away from the fortress.

Other Rumors.

There are said to be indications that the Russians have become reconciled to the probable fall of Przemyśl, and the possible evacuation of Lemberg is seen in the transfer of military headquarters from that city to Brody, on the Russian frontier.

The administration has been shifted to Zloczow, 40 miles east. Work on the fortifications around Lemberg has been discontinued, and aviators report that long trains of freight cars are leaving in the direction of the frontier. They do not show the Red Cross, and it is not that they are not transports of wounded, but are carrying to a place of safety supplies from the Lemberg magazine.
