SUPERVISORS

Delegations Ask That Track Regulations Regarding Percentages Be Changed.

ARE WELL REPRESENTED

Both Ontario and Quebec Are Taking Matter Up At Ottawa.

OTTAWA, May 13 .- The Journal this morning carries the following on its

sport page: "Opposition is developing against the Royal Canadian Mounted Police having supervision at Canadian race tracks. This assumed tangible shape yesterday, when a delegation from Western Ontario tracks and delegates representing Quebec tracks placed before the Government a request that the mounties be with-

drawn as supervisors of the pari-mutuel machines, and their power, recently conthe interests of the Government in handling the "take" be removed. This request was incidental to a request that the Government change the existing law governing the percentage allotted to tracks. Under the new legislation the Canadian tracks, it is claimed, will be strangled out of existence, when the provincial taxes are taken into con-

ideration Well Represented "Dalton McCarthy, K.C., representing the Canadian Racing Association; George Hendrie of the Windsor track, and one of the powers of Ontario racing: H. J Jockey Club, and, it is understood, Gen

Mewburn, former minister of militia, comprised the delegation. "The opposition of the Quebec tracks was volced in particular to the employ-ment of the mounties. They have forwarded their protests to Premier Meighen. Quebec race officials state that the presence of the mounties, while not objectionable, is unpopular in Que-

"One authority, not from Ottawa, who is in close touch with racing, states that the legislation authorizing the mounties to look after the locking of machines, is not looked on with dis-favor by the tracks, but they do not like the presence of the mounted police on their tracks, as it gives an effect of 'extraordinary police supervision.' At present private detective agencies police all the tracks in Ontario and Quebec.

Foremost Objection.

"The foremost objection is that the mounties have no experience in checking up and tabulating pari-mutuel returns. It is a class of work in which skilled mathematicians might find themselves at sea. There is no one in the mounted police force capable of doing this work. Only ten days intervene till racing starts, and it is obviously im-possible that men could be schooled in that time. It is understood that the Government has in mind securing the services of instructors to give the mounties the essential preparation. Racemen fear that the employment of inexperienced supervisors will result in retarding the calculation work between races, and result in general disorganiza-

The Journal's story expresses the be-lief that the regulations will be changed.




