HAMILTON, Aug. 10.—Hamilton turned on London today in the third game of the series and gave them a sound 7 to 3 drubbing. Deloitte who defeated Bill Morrisette here last year in the memorial 20-inning game, had nothing that the Hams couldn't hit and he was wild as well. Hamilton got a run in the first inning, one in the second, two in the third and three in the fourth, bunching their hits with passes. The Londoners struck a snag in Jack Matte, the Boston Red Sox recruit, who held them to eight scattered hits. Vandye's running catch of Jack Blake's drive in the eighth inning with O'Rourke on first was the deciding feature. In the two previous games London outclassed Hamilton. Wilson and Downey Meet On Labor Day

Middleweight Championship Will Be Decided.

BOSTON, Aug. 10.—Martin Killalea, manager of Johnny Wilson, middleweight champion, announced tonight that Wilson had been matched by Tex Richard to meet Bryan Downey in a twelve-round non-decision bout at Jersey City on Labor Day. In a recent bout at Cleveland the referee awarded the decision to Wilson on a foul, but the Cleveland boxing commission announced that it had overruled the decision and would recognize Downey as champion on the ground that he had actually scored a knockout. The Massachusetts boxing commission has refused to recognize the action of the Cleveland body.

Wilson will receive 30 per cent of the gate receipts and Downey 25 per cent. Both men are to weigh 160 pounds at 10 o'clock in the morning. They will enter the ring at 4 p.m.

YANKEE TENNIS STARS AGAIN TAKE MAJORITY OF GAMES AT NIAGARA

1918 Junior Champ Defeated by Anderson of New York.

NIAGARA-ON-THE-LAKE, Aug. 10.—United States competitors again proved victorious in the majority of tennis championships here today, some of the most exciting games of the week being witnessed by a good crowd. The feature match of the day was that between Harold Taylor of New York, 1918 junior champion, and Frank Anderson, New York, American indoor champion, which resulted in a win for the latter, 6-3, 7-5. Anderson's fine serving and deadly overhead work won the first set for him. In the second set Taylor led at one time, 5-4, and 20-love in his favor, but Anderson tightened up and served three aces.

Clifford Herd of Chicago beat J. M. Laing of Waterloo, and then A. R. Bernhardt of Preston in straight sets. He served with terrific force.

INTERNATIONAL 15-MILE YACHT RACE WON BY ENGLAND

Final Score of Event Was England 117, United States 88.

COWES, Isle of Wight, Aug. 10.—Great Britain today won the international six-meter yacht race from the team of four United States boats sent across seas to contest for the cup.

The sixth and final race in the series was won by the British racers by a margin of four points the home boats scoring 29 and the visitors 15. Previously the point score stood at 97 for the British craft and 72 for the United States, thus making the final score: Great Britain, 117; America, 88.

The course for today's race of 15 miles afforded less windward work than in the previous races. The United States boats got a good start with Grebe in second place, Sheila in fourth, Genie in sixth and Montauk in seventh. The British order of crossing the starting line was Jean first, Victoria third, and Polly fifth, with Fly A, eighth.

Grebe had a slight lead at the first mark, but the Jean was ahead at the second and third marks and finished the round 19 seconds in front of Grebe.
