In a recent bout at Cleveland the referee awarded the decision to Wilson on a foul, but the Cleveland boxing commission announced that it had overruled the decision and would recognize Downey as champion on the ground that he had actually scored a knockout. The Massachusetts boxing commission has refused to recognize the action of the Cleveland body.
