Toronto, April 2.—Fresh sensations were provided for the public accounts committee of the Legislature this morning, when Joseph C. Whitaker, general supervisor of the defunct Home Bank, took the stand and told of numerous visits of Hon. Peter Smith, former provincial treasurer, to Col. J. Cooper Mason, the late general manager of the bank.
