

CORUNNA PASTOR
RESIGNS PULPIT

Rev. H. R. Williams Accepts
An Invitation To Sandusky,
Ohio, Church.

Sarnia, Feb. 12.—Rev. H. R. Williams of Corunna, Ont., has accepted a call to occupy the pulpit of the Presbyterian church at Sandusky, Ohio, and has tendered his resignation to the Sarnia presbytery. Mr. Williams will assume duties March 1. Mr. Williams recently preached a trial sermon at the Sandusky church. A meeting of the Sarnia presbytery has been called for February 19 to deal with the resignation. Mr. Williams has been at Corunna for a little more than a year.

The co-operation of the Sarnia council in securing reconsideration and reduction in amounts payable by urban municipalities for provision of suburban road accounts is invited by the London city council in a letter received in the city hall today. The letter sets out that London has not paid anything on such accounts to date and that if anything is done the municipalities should work together. The local council is also requested to advise whether it would join in a delegation waiting on the government.

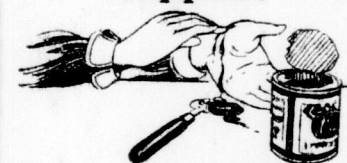
Long live St. Valentine's day, say the school children, and they acted accordingly.

BRITISH WOOL SHORTAGE
IS CREATING REAL ALARM

London, Feb. 13.—The dearth of wool supplies here is serious and the difficulty was increased yesterday by receipt of a telegram from the national council of wool brokers in Melbourne to the London wool merchants' association, saying it had been decided to reduce the offerings 50 per cent from Feb. 23.

The Daily Mail quotes a leading London dealer as saying that British manufacturers are unable to pay the high prices demanded and that at the January sales there was what amounted to a buyers' strike. The manufacturers now are working on diminishing stocks and when these are exhausted must pay whatever the growers demand.

Prices in 1924 steadily increased, the advance varying from 35 to 57 per cent.

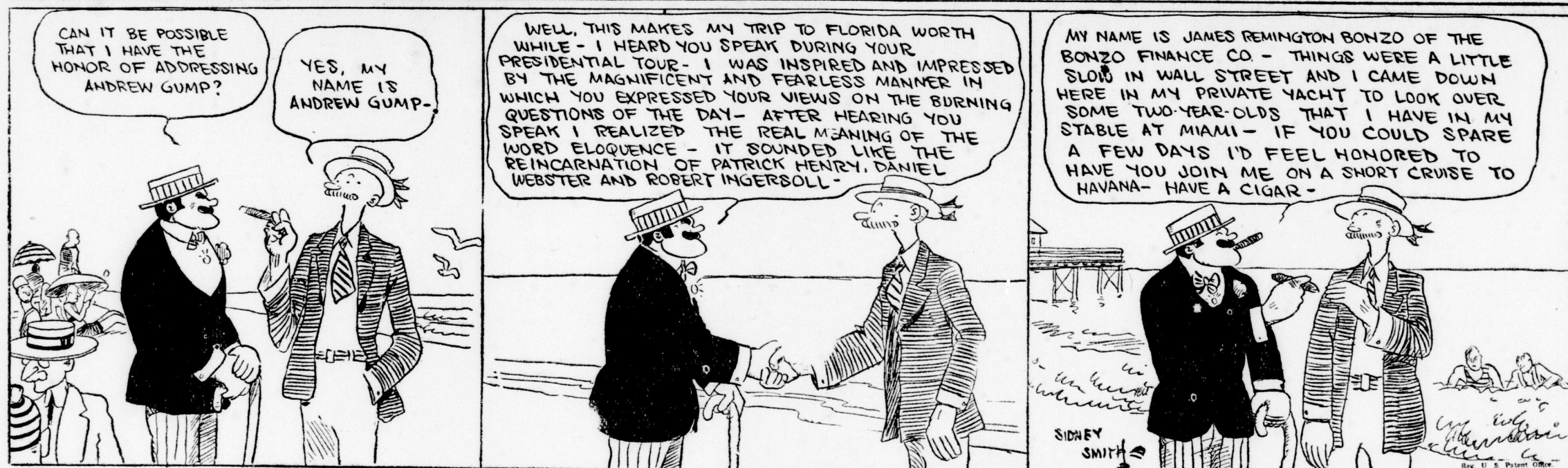

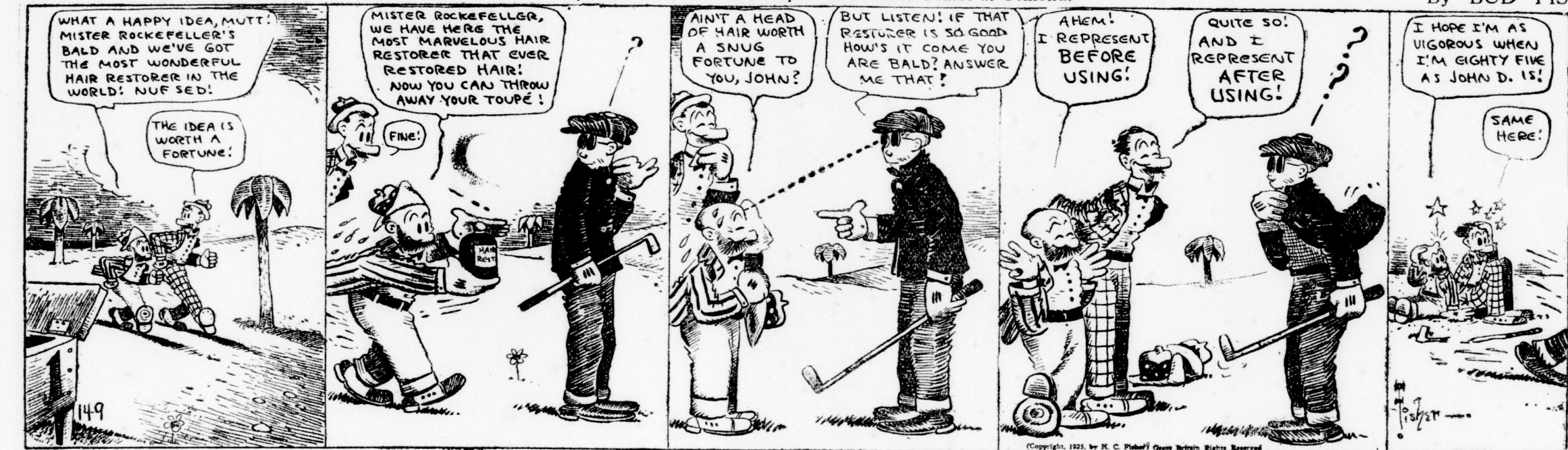

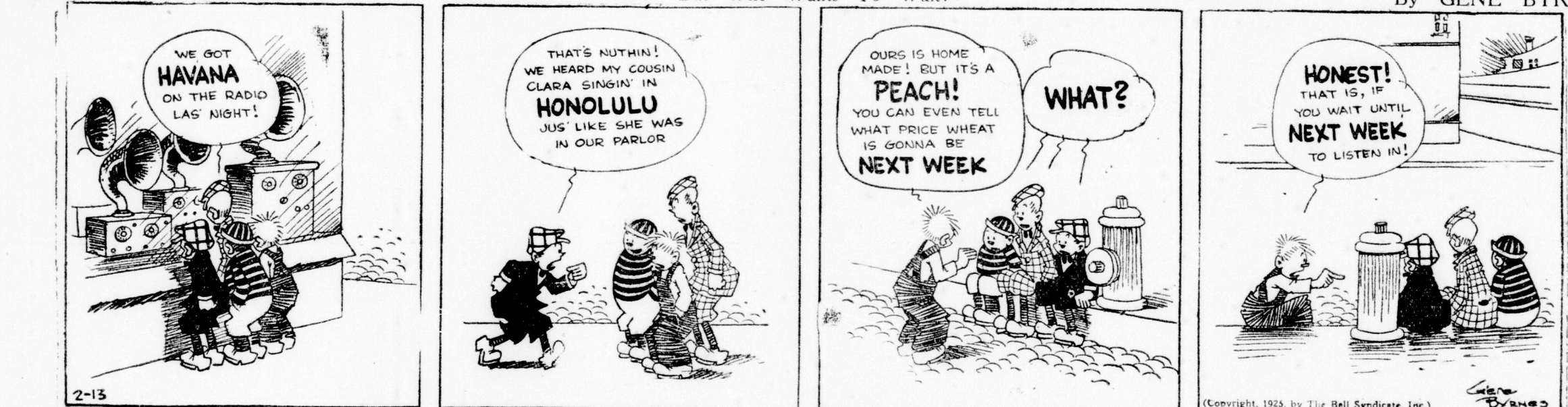

FORMER MEMBERS
PRAISE BOARD STAND

Rectory Street School Site
Meets With Favor of Last
Year's Trustees.

The wisdom of the building program adopted by the board of education last night to erect a new collegiate on the Rectory public school site and an addition to the technical high school was endorsed this morning by A. Norton Udy and Rev. G. Q. Warner, former members of the board.

Mr. Udy who was chairman of the advisory-vocational committee last year, expressed his unqualified approval of the addition to the technical school. He declared that the work being done by the technical school, in making possible practical education for young men and women and young married householders, was a splendid one and should be encouraged to the fullest extent.

He pointed out that last year he had stood alone in the board for one year, and consequently he considered the action of the board this year in going after one collegiate at a time to be good business.

Speaking from an economical point of view, Mr. Udy said that the choice of the Rectory street site was a wise one, but that if the board had had a larger amount of funds at its disposal the Rectory street site might possibly

QUEBEC LEGISLATURE
TO TALK ESTIMATES

Decision Follows a Strenuous
Debate—Asbestos Industry
Boosted.

Quebec, Feb. 13.—Without opposition and following a strenuous debate which has been raging since Feb. 3, when Hon. Jacob Nicol, provincial treasurer, delivered the budget speech, the legislative assembly last night voted the motion of the treasurer to go into supply.

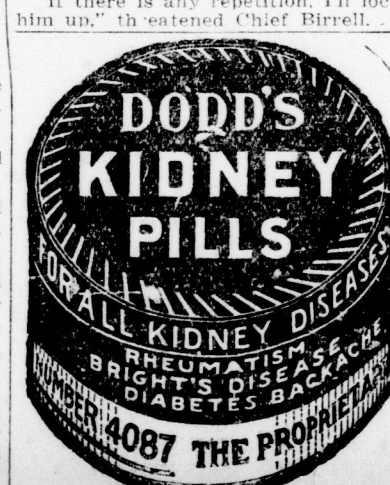
The wind-up of the debate last night found Hon. Mr. Patenaude urging a vigorous policy of reforestation, and Hon. Jacob Nicol making a general defence of the financial situation of the province. The minister said that foreign capital had played a big part in the development of the province, and was welcome. The province of Quebec, said the treasurer, believed in a policy of development of waterpowers by private capital, as contrasted to the Ontario policy.

As regards the question of an embargo on asbestos, Mr. Nicol said this was entirely a federal matter and the provincial government would be delighted to see asbestos manufactured in the province.
