## WIFE IS IGNORED IN LIQUOR PLEA

#### A. Olizaravitch Convicted of Selling Liquor-May Set Precedent.

Although Mrs. Stella Olizaravitch inexorably declared herself to be en tirely responsible for the illegal purchase of a quantity of liquor found by police at her home, 440 Simcoe street, her husband, Alex. Olizaravitch, being the occupant of the house, was convicted of the O. T. A. offence in this morning's police court. He was fined \$200 and costs and sentenced to a month in jail. In default of payment of the fine, he will be compelled to spend an additional

three months in jail.

Occupying the greater part of today's court session, the case was prolonged through legal technicali ties and arguments between Howard Cluff, counsel for the defence, and Magistrate Graydon. Olizaravitch's conviction will probably set a precedent for future O. T. A. cases where

similar conditions prevail.

Interpretation of Magistrate Graydon's ruling holds that the occupant of a house must assume liability for liquor which is found on his prem-ises. Although Mrs. Olizaravitch declared that she had bought seven gal-lons of alcohol without her husband's knowledge, and that she had hidden it in a shed in the back yard, her husband was also charged under three sections of the O. T. A. The two minor charges of illegal purchase of liquor and having liquor in a place other than a private dwelling were dropped by the crown waen Olizaravitch was convicted on the more serious offence of keeping liquer

for sale.

Mrs. Olizaravitch's admittance of guilt of having illegally bought the alcohol was treated by the court as a subterfuge to shield her husband from having a second O. T. A. conviction recorded against him, for he was fined \$200 and costs a year ago for a breach of the O. T. A.


