PROF. PEACOCK ANSWERS TRIBUNE

The following letter has been received by Mr. H. J. Currie from Mr. Peacock, Director of Vocational Training for this province.

Mr. Peacock's letter answers the Tribune's attack on the Educational Department at Fredericton for wishing to introduce Vocational night classes at Campbellton.

The Tribune states that Campbellton is not entitled to the grant. No doubt Campbellton is not entitled to much consideration at Fredericton, but the department has offered the grant, why turn it down.

That paper also stated that the matter was misrepresented before the Council. His Worship Mayor Murray was present at the public meeting, and listened to Mr. Peacock's address. His Worship was also present at the Council when Coun. Currie made the statements referred to as misrepresentations, and was in a position to know whether they were correct or not. His Worship also addressed the public meeting strongly endorsing Vocational Night Schools Fredericton.

BOUGHT LUMBER FROM GOVERNMENT

All the lumber purchased by the British government in Canada during the war and which has not yet been shipped overseas was sold some months ago to an English syndicate which intends moving some of it to the old country in the near future. In fact some has already gone from the St. Lawrence and the North shore. A representative of the company was in the city yesterday looking over the area and arranging for a blanket insurance policy to cover all the lumber that is stored locally. Some of the lumber in question is piled on the wharves surrounding the harbor while more of it has been kept in lighters in the harbor.

The lumber is located all over the province and one firm has more than 7,000,000 feet at various points for which they have been awaiting orders from a British government for more than a year.

The science and technology of their vocations would be a help? It would indeed be surprising if Campbellton were in this respect peculiar among the towns of the civilized world. I hope you will bring these matters clearly to the attention of your town council, school board, and the citizens generally.
