

THE HEALTH OFFICER

Still More Delay—Another Advertisement for Medical Health Officer.

The Local Board of Health met yesterday afternoon. There were present Ald. Graham (chairman), Foster, Orr, Lucas, Hill, Atkinson, Small, the Mayor and Acting Medical Health Officer Dr. A. R. Fyne.

Dr. Cunniff, the late medical health officer, was being deposed the action of the city in suing him for the damages awarded against him and the city in the suit of Milk Dealer Forrester. He called attention to the fact that judgment was given on a technicality and not on the merits of the case. The Local Board of Health had endorsed his action and the City Solicitor will be asked to send in an opinion on the merits of the communication.

The City Commissioner informed the committee that he had advised a garbage and night soil crematory in the East End and was ready to commence building operations. He expected to have the crematory ready for business by April 1. The board approved the action of Mr. Cunniff, after listening to a protest from Ald. Small, who wanted the location changed to the West End.

An inspector is to be sent out to the Sunnyside Orphanage to see if it is true as alleged that the drainage from that institution pours into the lake within 1000 feet of the St. Albans water system.

Dr. Fyne recommended that a sanitary plumber be appointed to be under control of the department. The Mayor strongly opposed the recommendation, holding that the City Engineer should control all plumbing inspectors. The recommendation was adopted.

The last business taken up was the appointment of a medical health officer. Dr. Fyne at this stage left the meeting.

Ald. Hill moved that Dr. Covenor be recommended to council, as he stood first in the order of merit.

Ald. Orr: "I am not so certain that he stands first."

The Chairman: "I believe in sticking to the report of the experts and will support Dr. Covenor."

The Mayor: "The experts say that no one of the four—Dr. Covenor, Fyne, Allen, Bessy—should be appointed. I believe we ought to follow our own line of reasoning and raise the salary to \$4000 and advertise for a really good man."

Ald. Hill: "If for one will not consent to spend any more time or money on this matter. We have fooled long enough about it, and it is time to act. I do not know Dr. Covenor, but to his mind was the better man."

Ald. Small: "I will press my motion."

Ald. Lucas said there was nothing to show that Dr. Covenor was the best man in sanitation. He was first in chemistry, but he was not a requisite. Dr. Allen was first in sanitation, and to his mind was the better man.

The Mayor: "Dr. Covenor is first in chemistry. Dr. Allen is first in sanitation. Dr. Fyne has made charges under oath of unfair dealing on the part of the examiners. Now, I say that we ought to wash our hands of the whole matter and not appoint any one of these four men."

Ald. Small: "If you drop chemistry, Dr. Fyne and Allen are both ahead of Dr. Covenor."

Ald. Orr: "I vote that the report be laid on the table."

Ald. Hill's motion was defeated.

The Mayor moved that the salary attached to the position be \$4000.

This was defeated.

Ald. Orr then moved that the salary be \$3000.

This was adopted.

Ald. Atkinson proposed Dr. Allen.

This resulted in a tie vote of four to four and was declared a draw.

Ald. Small put forward Dr. Fyne's name, but his vote was the only one recorded for the acting official.

Ald. Atkinson then moved Dr. Bessy's name, but only got one vote, as a supporter.

The Mayor closed the meeting by moving that a medical health officer be advertised for, which course was adopted.

AT REST AT LAST

A Brave Soldier in the Battle of Life

Mounted by Comrades.

The funeral of the late Alexander Macdonald took place from his residence, Euclid-avenue, yesterday afternoon. There was a large number of mourners, including his sons Charles and John, Col. Jones, Mr. Ambrey White and others of the Crown Lands department. The funeral service was read both at the house and at the grave, by Rev. G. Webber of the Euclid-avenue Methodist Church. The pall-bearers were these members of the Army and Navy Veterans: J. Butler, Royal Marines; W. Evans, Home Army; W. Gallagher, 1st Brigade Royal Artillery; G. Goddard, Prince Consort Own Royal Brigade; W. J. Horton, 1st Brigade Royal Irish Fusiliers; and John Nunn, president of the Veterans.

The deceased arrived at Halifax in January, 1888, on the frigate Incomitant with his regiment, the 3rd Highlanders. Among others in that regiment were Mr. A. M. Smith, wholesale grocer, and Mr. A. Matheson, the druggist.

In the fall of the year the frigate proceeded to Montreal, and the deceased was sent with one of the companies of his regiment to Prescott, where he was in action.

The memorial service will be preached Sunday morning, in Euclid-avenue Methodist Church, by Rev. Mr. Webber. Members of the Army and Navy Veterans Society are invited to be present.

An Enormous Leather Belt

Messrs. P. E. Dixon & Co. of this city have just delivered to The Toronto Electric Light Company the largest leather belt ever manufactured in this province.

It is double thickness, thirty-eight inches in width, between ninety and one hundred feet long and weighs nearly six hundred pounds.

It is intended to drive the new 400-horse-power engine just finished for the Company by The Polson Iron Works Company and runs over a huge fly wheel fifteen feet in diameter.

This is the fourth large belt made by Messrs. Dixon & Co. for The Toronto Electric Light Company, the others being each thirty-six inches wide, averaging over one hundred feet long and all double thickness. One of them has been in constant use since 1888 and is apparently as good to-day as when it was first put on.
