A CONVICTION UNIQUE IN CRIMINAL ANNALS.

Although William Jones was Married...

But Once Yet He Committed Bigamy in the Eyes of the Law When He Married a Woman Whose Lawful Husband He Knew to Be Still Alive.

William Jones was sentenced at the Sessions by Judge Morson to 60 days in jail upon a charge of bigamy.

The indictment upon which he was convicted was given against him under clause B of section 275 of the Criminal Code, which says: "The act of any person who goes through a form of marriage in any part of the world with any person whom he or she knows to be married is bigamy."

The woman already had nine children and was married to a man named Jones and Mrs. Spaulding, then 17 years of age, were united in marriage at St. James Cathedral, Rev. Dean Graesselt officiating.

After a number of years of happy life, during which nine children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Stock, trouble arose in the home, the woman finally applying to Col. Denison's Court for an order of protection, which was granted.

Stock then went to live with her mother, Mrs. Ann Spilling, in Victoria-street, and worked as a waitress in a rooming house beneath her mother's apartments.

Jones went frequently to visit the parties with whom Mrs. Stock was employed, being something of a musician, he became a favorite at the little dancing parties which were given at the home.

On Dec. 10, 1898, there were festive proceedings at the home of Dr. Sims, Bond-street Congregational Church, for the clergyman Mrs. Stock gave her name to Mrs. Stock.

Stock became aware during the month of October of his wife's unlawful marriage, and having been informed by Mrs. Stock of her marriage to Jones, he was arrested by Detective Harrison, Mrs. Stock was convicted and sentenced to a term in the county jail, which has not yet expired.

The defence offered by Jones was that the marriage between Stock and Mrs. Spaulding had been annulled, and that the marriage between Stock and Mrs. Jones was lawful.

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
