THE CITY'S COAL BILL.

Solicitor to Determine Amount of Deduction—Queen's Park Improvement Meeting of Executive Yesterday.

Acting Mayor Shaw presided at yesterday's meeting of the Executive Committee. Those present: Ald. Lamb, Jolliffe, Blong, R. H. Graham, Dunn, Burns, Scott and Hallam. The long-fought coal matter came up once more. The report of the Board of Works recommended the payment of \$115,000 for the excess of ash over and above the 6 per cent. allowed in the specifications, was deducted. The tests on which were the basis of this allowance were made by Mr. Speller, who tested every vessel load. Several aldermen were anxious that the deduction should be on the basis of a special test of the excess of ash made by Prof. Ellis, which would make the allowance for ash about \$640. On suggestion of Ald. Scott, the amount was referred to the City Solicitor to ascertain whether the city would be justified in deducting this larger sum on the basis of tests which had not been made.

High Park Toboggan. The clause in the Parks and Gardens report permitting James Downs to erect a toboggan slide in High Park and to charge for admission to it by 25 season tickets, was referred back.

Queen's Park Improvements. It was decided that the city should at once push on the work of improving the Queen's Park south of the Parliament buildings itself at an expenditure of \$2000.

Passed Without Discussion. The Fire and Light Committee's rejection of the Merryweather engine was acquiesced in without a word, as was the proposal to accept the Gas Company's tender for civic gas lamps provided the minimum number was reduced from 1000 to 800.

The new water works by-law was also sent on to the Council without discussion.

Ald. Lamb moved that the City Clerk be asked to report on the advisability of printing the early minutes of the Toronto City Council, but the motion was dropped without discussion.

Dr. Spence was the spokesman asking for an increased grant of \$400 for the Western dispensary. Twelve thousand patients have been treated this year, according to the doctor's figures.

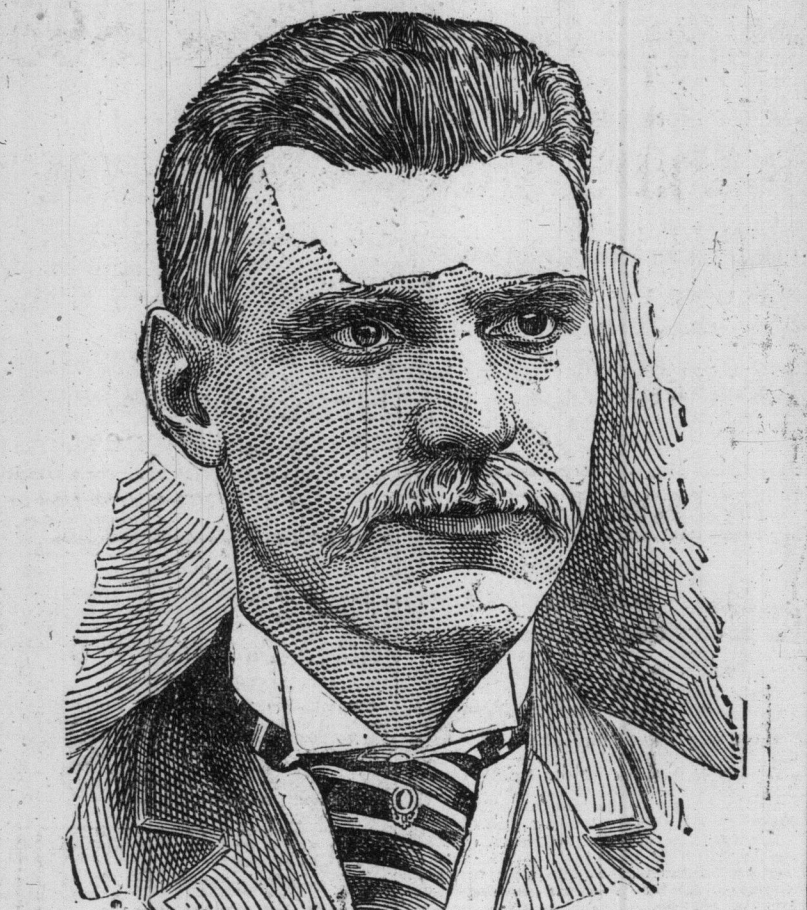

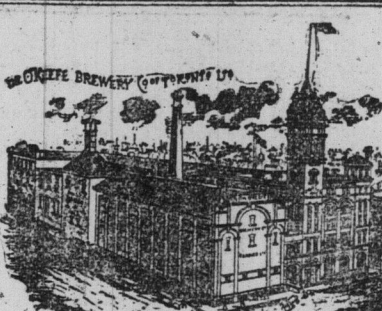
