Cutting Weeds On The Streets.

In the "Legal Department" of the Mail and Empire of last Saturday, the following questions, which had been sent from Forest, and the accompanying answers appeared:—Qu.—Has a Town Council power to pass a by-law compelling ratepayers to cut the weeds on the streets opposite their lots, and to appoint an inspector to notify the ratepayers when such weeds be cut? (1) If the ratepayers have been notified, and neglect to cut the weeds on the inspector or have them cut and charge the cost to ratepayers? (2) If the street at the back of my lot has never been open for public travel, and it has been used as a dumping ground for rubbish by order of the Town Council. Can I be compelled to cut the weeds on this street? Ans.—Section 547 of the Consolidated Municipal Act of 1903 says: "Municipalities may pass by laws for the purpose of preventing the growth of Canada thistles and other weeds detrimental to husbandry, and for compelling the destruction thereof."

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LITTLE BELL BIOGRAPHIES. Schumann. ROBERT SCHUMANN, born at Zwickau, 1810, died near Bonn, 1856, was celebrated as a composer and as a critic of music. He might have become a pianist of the highest order had he not crippled the third finger of his right hand in an attempt to make it stronger and more facile by some mechanical device. And for a pianoforte piece, strictly such, there is not in the realm of music anything so ravishing and haunting as his sensuous "Traumerel" (Dreaming). Schumann's pianoforte works have this virtue also—they are indispensable to the teacher and the student.
