This eminently good and hely man was born in the county of Donogal, Ireland, A.D., 521, and after a long and laborious life, the greater part of which was spent in promalgating the Gespel in Scotland, he died on the loland of Iona, A.D. 597, in the seventy-scrouth year of his age. He is said to have regarded the Sabbath with special sancting, and accounted it a great privilege to ould his life on that day. He retied, as was concerny in these days to the church at midnight to pray, and was found the sext morning on his knees dead. This circumstance, together with the uncommon platy of his life, imparted quite a fancily to the place, and, in consequence, it was long after used as a burist greend for the kings of Scotland, Iroland, and Norway.

It is easid that the present ininhitants of the island, of whom there are not more then thirty families, still regard the Salaisath with special enerodaces. A story is related, in illustration of this fact, in counaxion with a visit of the Grand Duke Constantine, to the island some years since. The Duke wished to see the tembe of the kings on the Sabbath, but the old keeper of the Cathedral refused to give up the keys. When ashed if he keeper of the Cathedral refused to give up the keys. I suppose, from what she folk say, its only the Emperer of Russia; but I wadna gio up the key to my ain Queen on the Lord's day. There is a power shoon, superior to only cartily power; an I canna gie up the key." The life of this good and great man suggests some very important reflections. He had in his day no doubt, as many trials, difficulties and discouragements as any minister of the Gessel who lived since or before his time. If we were acquainted with his private experience, we would see that there were times, and perhaps of frequent cosurrence, when he felt that his labours smounted to very little. It is now more than twelve centuries since he rested from his labour, and no doubt his influence, the influence of a holy life, is not only felt in the little island of Iona, but has given direction to the subscents thistory of Scotland, and, in this indirect way has reached the meant distant ends of the earth.
