The following extract from Cax on's "Game of the Ckesse," printed at Westminster in 1474, may amuse some of our readers by its quaintness. It is perhaps needful to say that this work has not the most remote connection with Chess practically, but is Solved by Mrs. II. Moselev, H. A. McD., Thorbarne, u.d. "Dixie," Anti-gonish. 


