The recent events in England have paralyzed speculation or the Continent, and the result is, that the great markets are dull, and prices stationary. The alarm respecting the deficiency in the potato crop is on

the decrease, and the present dull period of the year is not duller in the manufacturing districts of Lancasbire and Yorkshire than usual—perhaps less so. The Share market is look-ing up; the value of many of the old and some of the new speculations, is increasing. The funds have risen at least three per cent. from the point at which they stood before the question at issue, argued of course with an allowable amount of national feeling and prejudice, but presenting, on the whole, a just and generous standard of reason and logic.
