HON, EDWARD BLAKE,

GRAND RECEPTION IN TORONTO.

Thousands Fill the Hortfeultural Pavillon: Mr. Blake Makes an Eloquent Address.

Topoxio 19.—The reception given to Hon, Edward Blake, Home Rule member from Lengtord in the British House of Commons, was a grand success, both as regards numbers and enthusiasm. Al- miles. though admission was by ticket, the Horticultural pavilion was crowded with an audience of more than 4,000 and many hundreds of ticket-holders were turnedaway. Hon. Frank Smith presided and the address of the reception commit-

tee was read by Rev. Dr. Burns.

Mr. Blake was received with wild enthusiasm, and throughout his long address was frequently interrupted with prolonged cheers. He outlined the con-tinuous influences that had been brought to bear on the cause of Irish home rule by the people and parliament of Canada, and told how the moral support of the people's representatives had never failed when the cause seemed most hopeless. The whole speech was characterized by Mr. Biake's recognized fairness in debate, and when dealing with the opponents of the cause he advocated the possible motives by which they were actuated he was always fair and considerate. In dealing with the economic evils he

clearly showed how the condition of the people was due to the existence of a per-petual class of landlords and a perpetual class of tenants, a condition under which the producing class was despoiled of all but the barest subsistence. Sometimes, he said, they were not even allowed to retain a bare living, and the contributions of relatives who had emigrated were absorbed by the landlords. He was convinced of the absolute necessity of a system of resident freeholds.

Addresses were also delivered by Archbishop Walsh and several members of the Dominion and Provincial parliaments. Numbers of letters and telegrams were received, amongst them the following from Montreal:-

CELTIC CROSS FOR CHICAGO.

AN ADORNMENT TO THE 1818H VILLAGE AT THE WORLD'S FAIR.

Commissioned by the Countess Aberdeen, Mr. Charles Lamb, of the firm of J. & R. Lamb, of New York city, has sailed for the other side to isit the Irish graystone quarries Kilkenny, Ireland, to superintend the execution of a large Celtic cross, which is to be one of the prominent architecturfeatures of the "Irish Village" at the Columbian Exposition in Chicago.

This village is to be constructed under the patronage of the Countess of Aberdeen, who is greatly interested in developing Irish industries. It will be laid out in crooked streets and alleys, where quaint houses and huts will be er-ected. The market place will be the most important part of the village, and in its centre will be placed the Celtic cross. In the market place, also will be shown lace making, wood carving, weaving and kindred employments.

The cross will be made of the same durable stone as that used in all the recumbent tombs in the Kilkenny Cathedral and many early Irish monu-ments and cairns. It is to be a repro-duction of the Runic crosses prevalent in the ninth century, several of which still remain in good preservation in Ireland and were originally hewn from the Kilkenny quarries. The cross proper will be fifteen feet high, standing on a rough graystone base five feet high.
