TRANSPORT

Mr. Jean-Pierre Blackburn (Jonquière): Madam Speaker, I have good news today for the Canadian people. Hon. Benoît Bouchard has just been appointed to the senior Department of Industry, Science and Technology. His skills and ability will become an asset for regional development at a time when the disparities between the regions need to be alleviated. FORESTRY

Mr. Brian L. Gardiner (Prince George—Bulkley Valley): Madam Speaker, this government has failed completely to bring forward its environmental program. Now it has given up on federal-provincial forest agreements as the way to ensure that our forests are replanted.

Agreements with Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta have not been signed since they expired a year ago. In B.C.'s case, this government has sold out *Polar 8*, our softwood lumber and our fish. Now it has sold out our forest community by delaying the signing of a new forest agreement in B.C.

At the same time as the department is being proclaimed, its budget is being slashed and agreements remain unfunded.

The time has come to put an end to the Tory shell game. The minister should get on with it and sign new agreements now.
