SYNOPS'S OF DOMINION LAND REGULATIONS. ANY PERSON who is the sole head family, or any male over 18 years REGULATIONS. ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 13 years old may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoly. (1) Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or f sister of intending homesteader. Duties : Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homest-ad on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain Districts a homesteader in the social of pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, or fincluding may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead entry of six years from date of homestead entry of six years from date of homestead entry of six years from date of homestead home-stead or pre-emption six months in each or of six years from date of homestead home-stead in certain districts.
