FALSE GOSPEL GOT GERMANY INTO WAR

Rev. Wm. Patterson Gave
Eloquent Sermon at Cooke's
Church Yesterday.

SPLENDID WELCOME

Opening of Second Pastorate
Under Most Auspicious
Circumstances.

Most auspicious for a pastorate of more than usual success was the opening service conducted yesterday morning at Cooke's Church by the second pastor, Rev. Wm. Patterson, D.D. The large church with its capacity galleries was crowded in every part. An eloquent, dramatic and powerful sermon, with inspiring singing by a large choir featured the service.

Rev. Dr. Patterson adopted the appropriate declaration "Often times I purposed to come unto you," Romans 1, 11. He expressed his gratitude for the magnificent welcome demonstrated by the large number of members of his former congregation who he recognized among the assemblage, and the attendance of such a large number for a morning service.

He had come back to Toronto because he believed that the good people of Cooke's would rally around him as they did in former years. When 23 years ago he first came to Cooke's the British Empire was at peace with all the world. Some people claimed that the great war had shown the weakness of Christianity, but the war had, he believed, proved the strength of Christianity as never before.

A False Gospel.
It was a false gospel that brought Germany into the war, and the true gospel which brought Great Britain into it. The present war was the greatest endorsement of the whole truth of the Bible. Never before has been shown the power of truth as in the present war.

Had Lost Faith.
These vast German cathedrals are now filled," said Dr. Patterson, "because they think that God is their ally, and they want to try and please him, but before the war these structures had been practically empty. Why? Because the ministers sat with in God, and the people in the cathedrals. A false gospel had come into being—the self same false gospel which had resulted in the spoliation of Belgium and the desecration of the country's time-honored and sacred cathedrals."

It was a false gospel which swept aside Germany's pledge to Belgium, to keep sacred her independence, as a ramp of paper. It is fidelity to a true gospel to stand by a solemn covenant no matter what the expense, no matter what the consequences."

Rev. Dr. Patterson drew a congregation last night which exceeded the capacity of Cooke's Church. This was a repetition of his success when pastor before.

PATRIOTISM NEEDS UNION AND TRUCE

George M. Wrong Says De-
mand for Organized Action
is Quite Clear.

Editor World: The answers to my published letter urging that there shall be no general election during the war have been so decisive in tone that the demand for organized action is quite clear. An observer as acute as the Bishop of London declares that even England requires more complete concentration if the enemy is to be defeated.

We are as yet far behind England in concentration, and our need for it is therefore the greater. There is but one vital problem before us, and a genuine patriotic demands union on this and a truce in regard to all other political questions until the war is over.

I cannot reply directly to the many persons who have written to me in this sense. Let me only say that I have taken counsel with some whose aims are the same as my own, and that we are arranging for a public meeting in Burwash Hall, Victoria College, Toronto, on Friday evening April 23, 1915, in regard to this meeting will be announced in a day or two. Since the danger is real it is proposed to organize for the two aims of support to the present government until the war is over and of opposing the holding of a contested election.

This is what the parties are doing in Britain. It is for us to follow a worthy example.

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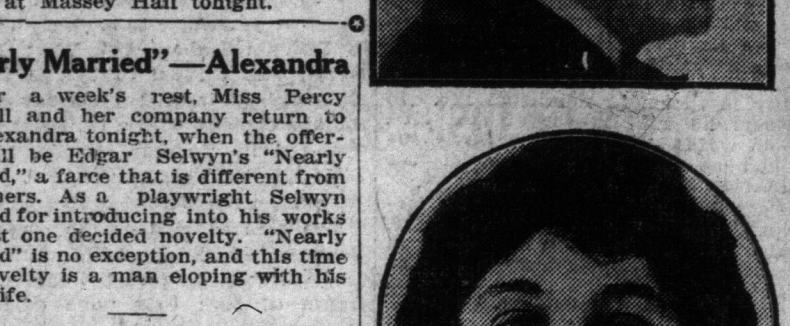

CORNWALL TO HAVE INDUSTRY FROM U.S.

CORNWALL, April 18.—Frank Ross White of New York, a former Cornwall resident, who has been in town for some time in the interest of the American Master Organ Co., has succeeded in securing the necessary amount of stock to warrant the company in establishing its Canadian branch in Cornwall, and has left here to complete the arrangements. It is not intended to manufacture the organs here at present, but to ship the parts from Warsaw, N.Y., and assemble them here.

At a meeting of the town council the industrial committee reported that in conjunction with the industrial committee of the Cornwall Board of Trade, it had decided to issue about 5000 attractive folders, pointing out the advantages of Cornwall as a manufacturing centre, the folders to be mailed to the manufacturers of the British Isles, the United States and other countries. The matter for the folder is to be prepared by W. Gibbens, editor of The Standard.

David M. Crites, who represented the Canada Steamship Lines here last season, has been promoted to divisional freight agent, with headquarters at Windsor.

Mrs. Walter H. Hawthorn has received a souvenir from her husband, who is commander of one of his Majesty's warships in the North Sea. It is a pencil enclosed in a case fashioned from a cartridge bullet used in the present war, the gift of Queen Mary to the officers of the navy. The case is engraved with the crown and the Queen's initials, "M."

in Big Parade.

POLICE APPROVE ROUTE

Large Meeting Arranged for
in Massey Hall—Three
Bands in Attendance.

At a meeting of the anniversary committee of the Independent Order of Oddfellows in Oddfellows' Hall, Saturday night, arrangements were made for the ninety-sixth anniversary celebration of the order, to be held on Sunday, May 2. It was decided to issue invitations to the ten thousand Toronto members, and a notice of the place of meeting for parade. Mayor Church has accepted an invitation to be present.

The route of the parade has been approved by the chief of police. Major W. J. Foster, grand marshal, will have charge of the parade, which will line up at College and Huron streets, and proceed east on College to Yonge, Yonge to Carlton, Carlton to Jarvis, south on Jarvis to Shuter, west to Massey Hall.

Bands in Parade.
Three bands will be in the parade, the Victor Brass Band, Western Brass Band, and the band of the Hamilton Carleton, which will in all probability come with the large delegation from Hamilton.

The military section of the Toronto and Hamilton branches will turn out in their magnificent uniforms. In Massey Hall the service will be in charge of H. M. Armstrong, Rev. Hiram Hull will preach the sermon.

The music will be supplied by the choir of the Parkdale Methodist Church, assisted by the Temple Quartet. Collection will be taken, all of which will be given to the Canadian Red Cross fund. The committee expects to raise \$1000.

THREE EVAPORATORS BURNED BY ALIENS?

Plants Were Working on
Large Orders From British
Government.

BELLEVILLE, April 18.—On Friday night at the Village of Frankfort, Sidney Township, an evaporator owned by George Graham and operated by R. J. Graham of this city, with its contents, destroyed by fire. There is no doubt in Mr. Graham's mind that the fire was incendiary. This is the third evaporator burned in this section this year, and all were operated by the Graham Company. The other buildings destroyed were located at Tweed and Shannonsville.

The company had a large order for supplying evaporated potatoes and apples for the use of the British army, and were actively engaged in preparing this food when the buildings were burned. The loss sustained by the third fire is partially covered by insurance.

**BROCKVILLE MAN
WOUNDED IN LEGS**
Thomas Carse in Shorncliffe
Hospital Suffering From
Blood Poisoning.

BROCKVILLE, Ont., April 18.—Thomas Carse, a Grand Trunk Railway fireman who left here with the first Canadian contingent last August, is in the hospital at Shorncliffe, Eng., suffering from injuries sustained while in action in France, according to information just received here. He was caught by a German sniper getting into a trench and was shot in both legs. Blood poisoning has developed and it is feared amputation of both limbs will be necessary. Mrs. Carse left Brockville a few days ago to be with her husband.
