OTTAWA, June 28 .- W. F. Garland, M.P. forCarleton, at the army contrac probe this morning, admitted getting \$6300 of Drug Clerk Powell's profits from the contract for medical supplies to the militia department. He admitred that he knew the source of the money Powell had had in the bank, and instructed him to withdraw it. According to Powell, Garland re caived \$9166 from him, but Garland explained the difference in figures by stating that the balance was taken out and placed in his current account to pay Bauer and Black, the Chicago drug firm, when the government held up

Garland testified that he had returned the money in various amounts to Pewell on March 9, 10 and 11, and at his request Powell drew a cheque on March 27 for \$6300, payable to the chairman of public accounts.

Money Went for Debts.
Garland said that he had no conversation with W. H. Brown, director of contracts, as to profits. He had a disagreement with Brown before he was elected. He did not receive all the money from Powell personally Four hundred dollars went to Boyd or a trade debt, \$3000 went to R. F. Half-penny on a debt, and another \$1700 went to some one he did not recolle The \$2500 or \$3000 unaccounted for went into real estate. He had no un derstanding to pay Powell anything, and nothing was paid him, for the account was never closed.
