WHY GERMAN FLEET

SUFFERED DEFEAT

Consciousness of Right-
eous Cause.

London, Dec. 8.—Articles by Premier Lloyd George, Sir Eric Geddes, the first lord of the admiralty, and Lord Pirrie, the controller-general of merchant shipbuilding, are printed in the current number of an educational journal devoted almost entirely to matters connected with the navy and the merchant marine. Mr. Lloyd George, in his article, referring to the summary of the German fleet, says it was a significant event because it symbolized in a fitting manner the absolute triumph of the allied cause.

To Bring Ex-Kaiser to Book
After Consulting Dominions

London, Dec. 8.—Walter Long, speaking last night, said that he rejoiced as colonial secretary that they had made up their minds to extend colonial preference without conditions of any kind. He also said, not only must the Kaiser be tried, but Germany must pay the last farthing possible, even if it took her 30 years.

Attorney-General Smith has announced that the resolve to bring the Kaiser to book is taken after consulting representatives of the Dominions. One newspaper remarks on the absence in this election of carpet-baggers from the dominions who go to Westminster and profess to have special knowledge of the feeling overseas.

AMERICANS CONTINUE ADVANCE.

Washington, Dec. 8.—Gen. Pershing's communique for yesterday said: "The third American army continues its advance into Germany, today reached the general line Ruppertsberg-Boos-Kemmerich-Maxen-Greimersburg-Simmern-Kellenbach."
