POSTCARD RIOT.

Japs Climb Roof to Secure Copies and Fall Thru.

Tokio.—The craze for picture postcards led to extraordinary rioting in the streets of Tokio yesterday, when the series of picture postcards issued by the government in commemoration of the war with Russia were placed on sale at the postoffices.

Double files of people a mile long were waiting outside most of the offices as soon as they opened.

At one place the police lost control of the crowd, who began a desperate struggle to gain admittance. The fence round the postoffice was trampled down, and the people climbed up the walls on the roofs and fought their way in thru the windows.

Under the weight of people part of the roof fell in, while the walls were damaged and the windows were smashed. Those who could not get near threw stones at the building.

To quell the disturbance soldiers were called out. They charged the crowd with fixed bayonets, and the fire brigade played streams of water on them. The postcards which caused the riot consisted of views of the sacred shrines where regular services for the dead soldiers were held, and where the emperor worshipped in the past. QUEBEC IS STIRRED SOME BY SUNDAY LEGISLATION

English and French Agree That Bill in Commons Will Not Do.

Montreal, June 28.—(Special.)—The politicians are rapidly reaching the conclusion that this city is being deeply stirred as the last stages of the Sunday bill are being reached in the house of commons, and people who come in from the country declare that the hostility against the measure is quite as intense in the rural sections of the province.

It is quite evident that the meeting called for to-morrow evening, on the Champ de Mars, to protest against the leading details of the bill, will be a monster affair. The speakers announced for the occasion are evenly divided as far as party affinity is concerned, although, of course, the heaviest gun of them all will be Henri Bourassa of Labelle.

English Also.
One of the remarkable features in the present agitation is the open hostility to the bill manifested by the English-speaking business men of the city. They, in fact, oppose it to a man as mischievous, intolerant and unworkable. His worship the Mayor of Montreal, who is an Anglican, has made the following statement, which truly represents the citizens:

"I shall not be able to attend the demonstration, but I shall send a letter to the meeting, stating that I am in full accord with the sentiment of those who have called the meeting. After considering the bill, I feel convinced that it is not one that is suitable to the people of this province. It would be a constant source of discord and irritation. It would be one of the most difficult measures in the world to enforce. So far as Montreal is concerned, it is now a large and important city, and it cannot have Sunday legislation that would be suitable only for a village."

"I cannot believe that the bill will pass. It is so foreign to the wishes of the people of this province that it can never meet with favor. In all such measures as these there ought to be a lot of give and take. There does not need to be much of the 'give' in the bill. Tolerance is the only principle that will enable the people of this province to live in harmony. This tolerance is not to be found in the bill in question."

Continuing, his worship said that he had received a telegram from a leading citizen of Winnipeg, asking if the people had a chance to vote on Sunday cars, if they would vote in the affirmative. In reply, he dictated the following telegram: "Sunday street cars have a chance of convenience which our people will never be without. (Signed) Ekers."

One of the tricks of the politicians is to tell the French-Canadians that it is not a government measure, but the people see thru such a falsehood. The government or prime minister responsible for the legislation will be charged to defeat in the Province of Quebec. The feeling against Hon. Mr. Fielding is particularly bitter, as the finance minister's attitude on the question of Sunday labor has sealed his fate in the Province of Quebec. It has always been the custom with the French parish priests to advise their people to get out and save their hay or grain on Sundays when the weather is threatening, and any interference with such a practice will certainly be resented.

Significant.
The tone of the Herald's staff correspondent from Ottawa today is most significant. "Old parliamentary history," he says, "do not remember a time when the house was so out of hand as it has been to-night. The cabinet was divided and sub-divided. The Liberal party was divided. If he elects to see it thru they will trust to his judgment, which they say has never failed yet, and will sit in to see the thing thru, even if the temperature gets to be as high outside the house as it is inside. And after that there will be the senate to hear from, and it is said that the able athletes of that body are just aching to show their prowess."

Erskine Douglass Warren was graduated in the department of law, with the degree of bachelor of laws. Both are from Toronto.

BOARD HAS TO BE SHOWN.
The application of Stratford to be allowed to extend its waterworks system will be up again before the provincial railway and municipal board on Wednesday next. Witnesses will be presented by the city to satisfy the board that the added revenue will be sufficient to pay the increased debenture debt and interest, as required by the board.

Mysterious Epidemic.
Paris.—All the markets and schools around Rouillet, in the department of the Charente, have been closed and public meetings forbidden owing to the ravages of a mysterious epidemic which was described by Prof. Chantemesse at the Academy of Medicine to-day. The chief symptoms are profuse perspiration, followed by great prostration, and an eruption which makes the skin look as if it were covered with millet seeds. The cause of the disease is a mystery to the doctors.

GUEST AT WEDDING FEAST SHOT BY CHARIVARI PARTY

Joseph Hussey Wounded in Face and Side by Charge From Shotgun.

Goderich, June 28.—Joseph Hussey, guest at a wedding party at Kingsbridge, was wounded by a shot from a gun in the hands of one of a charivari party last night, and may die.

Yesterday was the wedding day of John Dalton and Miss Frances Moss of that place, and in the evening there were festivities at the couple's new home.

About midnight a charivari party put in an appearance, and Joseph Hussey, 25 years of age, went outside to quiet the disturbance. A gun carried by one of the demonstrators was discharged, and several of the shot struck Hussey in the head and side, blood flowing freely from the wounds. Doctors were summoned from Goderich and Kintail, and in response to a message Provincial Constable Phelan left this morning for Kingsbridge to investigate. It is likely several arrests will be made.
